Collect

Almighty Lord and everlasting God,

we beseech you to direct, sanctify and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of your laws and the works of your commandments; that through your most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Genesis 15.1-6

After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.' ⁴But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Second Reading Hebrews 11.1-3, 8-16

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible. By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.' All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Gospel Reading Luke 12.32-40

'Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. 'Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves. 'But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.'

Sermon for Sheila's Farewell Service

Psalm 92

Philippians 4:1-9

John 15: 1-17

"May the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord our rock and our redeemer."

Firstly, I'm so grateful to Revd Sarah for inviting me to preach on this special day as we honour The Reverend Sheila Hart and give thanks for her 14 years of ministry in this Benefice – it's a great privilege.

As you know, after much thought and following a difficult time with health issues, Sheila has decided the time is right for her to step down from her role as Assistant Priest. In due course, Sheila intends to join the ranks of our esteemed retired clergy with permission to officiate, so rather than a final goodbye – let's hope this is more of an 'au revoir'.

Sheila has been a faithful minister of the Word of God for over 40 years. First feeling God's call on her life at the age of 15 and then becoming a local preacher in the Methodist Church at the tender age of 18.

In 2003 Sheila and her husband Stephen moved to Saxmundham and began to worship with the Church of England congregation there. Sheila told me they had come to Saxmundham for a rest, but God had different ideas!

It was Richard Webb who challenged her to think about ordination and to cut a long story short, she was Deaconed in 2008 and Priested the following year. Sheila was appointed Assistant Priest to our newly formed Benefice in 2011 and became Rural Dean in 2018.

As we give thanks for Sheila's ministry, it might be worth considering what Christian ministry is all about. What is a minister?

Forget the old quip that we have it easy because we only have to 'work' one day a week... anyone involved in ministry can tell you it's not like that at all...

Put simply, I think a minister is one who acts on behalf of another. Our ministry belongs to Jesus Christ, and we represent Him as His ministers.

Our ministry isn't a possession that belongs to us, but a call we obey, a service we carry out for another – and we are all called to ministry in some form or another.

Sheila, I imagine the transition from full time ministry to retirement might be at the same time exhilarating and a little bit frightening. Like a trapeze artist who lets go of one bar but hasn't quite grabbed a hold of the next... and perhaps the analogy holds true for congregations saying goodbye to a long serving priest and wondering about the future without them.

But ministry always builds on the work of others. As St Paul told the Corinthians, "I planted, Apollos watered, but it is God who gives the growth."

Sheila, your many years of hard work and devotion to ministry – all in a self-supporting capacity, have been a blessing to so many, you have given us a huge amount – please be assured through God's good grace we will do our best to nurture everything you have planted.

Our three readings this morning encourage all of us in our work, growth and collective ministry...

The Psalmist reminding us that flourishing, and fruitfulness is not the preserve of youth – on the contrary, if we remain planted in the house of the Lord, we can remain evergreen and full of sap!

In a similar way St Paul urges the Philippians to stand firm in the Lord, rejoicing in Him and knowing His peace – and rather appropriately for today, he also urges them to help the two women; Euodia and Syntyche who he says have been struggling beside him in the work of the gospel. And Jesus' words in John 15 have been described by some as the 'heart of the Gospel' they come from His last discourse when he was opening his heart, and about to leave his disciples.

And what does he say? He tells them 'Remain in my love, love one another. I won't call you servants anymore; I call you friends. You did not choose me, I chose you. I commissioned you to go out and bear fruit'. These are words that come from the heart.

At the beginning of that chapter Jesus says 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower... I am the vine and you are the branches' This is why he says, 'remain in my love' – like a branch of the vine. Don't disconnect. It's why he says; 'Go and bear fruit' the image runs on.... But for fruit to grow, the branch must be rooted in the vine and the vine rooted in the earth. Well, Sheila, if there was ever a rooted person, a 'Remainer' (and I'm not talking politics) it's you!

Your whole life has been rooted in your faith, your church settings, your teaching career, your marriage, and family, and all the while steadily bearing fruit; in various parishes and in many different ways – perhaps more ways than you realise or will ever know. One person recently told me you had saved their sanity during the covid lock-downs by taking the time to call regularly.

We live in famously unstable times; many people uprooted and unsettled at many levels, so much uncertainty and change.

Sheila, you've been a refreshing contrast... stable, calm and equable. Always sensible, always helpful – a secure point of reference. Full of memories, but not a slave to them. Very patient with me when I was starting out as a curate – so good to work with – so encouraging and reassuring – I will always be grateful to you for your guidance.

There you are, the rooted, fruitful vine in the midst of the house, a branch that remains.

Many would like to know your secret Sheila; the special blend of nature and grace that has made it all possible. If only it could be patented and bottled – a fortune could be made!

'I no longer call you servant' Jesus says, 'I call you friends.' Many people are blessed to call you a friend Sheila, so thank you – from all of us here and many who are unable to be here today.

So, retirement dawns. It might have its surprises, but I remember a sermon you delivered at a baptism when I was in training, and you invited me to come along and help. You pointed out that water can take many forms; still or running, hot or cold, turning into ice or steam, but it's always water, and so the moral is that the grace that begins to flow in our baptism is able to adapt itself to all the changes of our lives and it carries us through.

So, I think the Vine, the Tree will stay by the flowing waters. It won't diminish or be blown over. It will survive global warming and its leaves will remain green. It won't mind the drought, for as the prophet Jeremiah says 'it does not cease to bear fruit'.

We're watching this space, Sheila. Thank you – more than words can say.

On behalf of the clergy team past and present, everyone here, and the whole Benefice and Deanery, we wish you all the best for the future, and may the joy and peace of Christ always be in your heart.

Sheila, to honour your Methodist roots, may I conclude by offering up the Methodist Covenant Prayer. It's a beautiful prayer, with special meaning for you, but it's a prayer that I think we could all do with praying... Let us pray...

Lord God. I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you, exalted for you, or brought low for you; let me be full. let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing: I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven.' Amen.
