Collect

Almighty God, in Christ you make all things new: transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace, and in the renewal of our lives make known your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 49.1-7

Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away! The Lord called me before I was born, while I was in my mother's womb he named me. He made my mouth like a sharp sword, in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished arrow, in his quiver he hid me away. And he said to me, 'You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will be glorified.' But I said, 'I have laboured in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity; yet surely my cause is with the Lord, and my reward with my God.' And now the Lord says, who formed me in the womb to be his servant, to bring Jacob back to him, and that Israel might be gathered to him, for I am honoured in the sight of the Lord, and my God has become my strength— he says, 'It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the survivors of Israel; I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth.' Thus says the Lord, the Redeemer of Israel and his Holy One, to one deeply despised, abhorred by the nations, the slave

of rulers, 'Kings shall see and stand up, princes, and they shall prostrate themselves, because of the Lord, who is faithful, the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you.'

Second Reading I Corinthians 1.1-9

Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and our brother Sosthenes, To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Gospel Reading John 1.29-42

The next day he saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.' The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched lesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him,

'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

Part two of Our Unsung Heroes by Jenny Digby (Lay Elder)

Meet The People - Our Lay Elders

In our January and second edition of Meet the People, I would like to introduce you to our Church Lay Elders. They play an important leadership role within the church, probably more in a spiritual way and this encompasses not just Aldeburgh, but within the Alde Sandling Benefice including Aldringham, Friston & Knodishall.

If you attended the wonderful 10.30am Sunday service in Aldeburgh, on 8th January, you will have seen that the church was packed and that we now have twelve Lay Elders within the Alde Sandlings Benefice. They were commissioned on this day by the Archdeacon Jeanette Gosney, the Archdeacon of Suffolk.

What exactly is a Lay Elder within the church I hear you ask? Must confess; this was the first question I asked when approached to see if I wanted to get a little more involved.

Preferring to take one step at a time instead of overcommitting, I was relieved to be advised, that you can do as much or as little to suit you, which sounded encouraging.

Then I began to think of our church structure shaped more by the corporate world than the scriptures. We have our Priest in Charge, Rev'd Sarah du Boulay, and a management team of church staff, the majority of which are volunteers and simply not on the payroll, hence our Unsung Heroes.

Elders are mentioned in the Bible, a Church should have them. But what are church Elders? What do they do? Are the Elders in churches the same as Elders in the New Testament?

Here's the short answer from the Apostle Peter:

"I exhort the Elders among you: shepherd God's flock" (I Pet. 5:2; see also John. 21:15-16 and Acts 20:28). Elders serve the Good Shepherd by providing his local flocks with spiritual oversight. Elders feed, lead, protect, and nurture church members like shepherds do with sheep.

In the same sense, a modern-day Elder will help with leading worship and pastoral care within their congregation and community, under the authority of the incumbent. Their ministry is shaped by their gift, availability, and local needs.

Pastorally, an Elder might visit people at home or in hospital, follow up baptisms or funerals, visit newcomers, work with young families or elderly people, or visit the local school.

Our twelve Lay Elders within the Alde Sandlings Benefice of Aldeburgh, Aldringham, Friston & Knodishall, are a team of committed Christians drawn from the church congregation who are commissioned by the Archdeacon to support mainly the pastoral work of the clergy team. I say commissioned, as to become a Lay Elder, firstly the volunteers need to undertake a training course. Some of our team of twelve are renewing their commitment for a further three years and some are new, like me. A huge chunk of the training is to understand the importance of 'Safeguarding', within the Church of England.

Safeguarding within the church is seen as part of the care and protection of children, young people and vulnerable adults involved in church activities, and is the responsibility of everyone who participates in the life of the church.

Once this training has been completed, the Lay Elders are ready to be commissioned by the Archdeacon and as this photo shows, this took place on Sunday, 8th January at St Peter & St Paul's church, Aldeburgh, with the Archdeacon of Suffolk, The Venerable Jeanette Gosney.
