Collect

Almighty God, who alone can bring order to the unruly wills and passions of sinful humanity: give your people grace so to love what you command and to desire what you promise, that, among the many changes of this world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 58.1-9a

Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practised righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgements, they delight to draw near to God. 'Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?' Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear-guard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am. If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil.

Second Reading I Corinthians 2.1-12

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God. Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written, 'What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him'— these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.

Gospel Reading Matthew 5.13-20

'You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot. 'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. 'Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfil. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

Post Communion

Merciful Father, who gave Jesus Christ to be for us the bread of life, that those who come to him should never hunger: draw us to the Lord in faith and love, that we may eat and drink with him at his table in the kingdom, where he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

Sermon by Rev'd Sarah du Boulay from The Benefice Service at Aldringham on the 29th January

Simeon and Anna Luke 2:22-40

I'm going to start my sermon today using a trope I usually hate. Forgive me. But I want to ask a question. What is resilience?

Well, according to the Cambridge Dictionary, resilience is either, a) the ability to be happy or successful after something difficult or bad has happened. Or b) the ability of a substance to return to its usual shape after being bent, stretched or pressed.

I think both are pertinent, and both apply to people as well as objects. To us.

I think resilience is an important part of the Gospel story we have heard today.

This telling of the presentation of Christ in the temple, comes immediately after Luke's narrative of the shepherds on the first Christmas night. We are told that after the shepherds left the Holy family in Bethlehem, Mary treasured their words about all they had experienced, and she pondered them in her heart.

Mary, we know, had to be resilient. She was pregnant and gave birth out of wedlock in less than ideal circumstances. She and her young family had to flee their home lest her baby be murdered by a jealous and cruel king. She raised this child, teaching him, feeding him, keeping him safe. She watched as he started his ministry. She saw him arrested, beaten, and killed. She knew exactly who her child was. And still she persisted. Mary was incredibly resilient. She had great faith and hope in God. We believe that Mary knew Jesus had been resurrected after the event (we know she lived as a disciple

with Peter, James, John and others, and was present at Pentecost). But this is after he died. Can you imagine the resilience she needed to embody? In this telling of the story, Simeon is also a model of resilience. When we meet him in this passage in Luke, he is an old man. He too has lived his life faithfully and holding on to the promises of the Old Testament. He is ready to die, but he knows - he has been promised - that he will meet the Messiah, the Christ child, before he does so. 'Now Lord, let your servant depart in peace, for your word has been fulfilled.' As he cradled the baby lesus, he blessed both him and his family, and foretold the story of heartache which awaited them all. 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed - and a sword will pierce your own soul too.' An impossible message for any parent to hear, but balanced with his message of hope – he names Jesus as God's plan for salvation; a light for revelation and for glory. Simeon meeting lesus was not a time to be fearful of the dangers of the future. It was not a time to be sad that Simeon's life was ending. It was a time for rejoicing and praising God. A time for hope.

And what of Anna? Well, Anna too has been referred to as a 'holder of hope'. She too is an old woman — widowed after only 7 years and then having lived to 84. Anna had clearly known loss and grief and hardship in her life. And yet we are told she never left the temple, but 'worshipped there with fasting and with prayer day and night.' She, like Simeon, instantly recognised Jesus, and began to speak about him — identifying him as the 'redemption of Jerusalem.' She kept her focus on God all of her life. She prayed constantly and openly, and one assumes, hopefully. Anna was resilient.

I wonder whether Mary remembered Simeon and Anna. I wonder if she remembered what they had said. How they had lived their lives. Their hope. I wonder if that memory may have given her comfort some 30 odd years later during dark times in her own life.

In my last two messages in our weekly newsletter, I have asked you two questions. The first is what makes your heart sing? The second is who makes your heart sing? The answers to both these questions remind us of love and hope and joy. Of God, in fact – we just sometimes need to be explicit about the link.

I wonder what situations we all need to be resilient about at the moment? Whether it's a family problem. Money issues. Somebody doing something we don't like. Self-doubt. Illness. World issues. From the war in the Ukraine, to something quite small, which is annoying but by no means a matter of life or death. Resilience.

I suggest to you that the key to resilience; the key to the ability to be happy or successful after something difficult or bad has happened. Or the ability of a substance to return to its usual shape after being bent, stretched or pressed. The key to resilience, is hope. And that hope is found exclusively in God. That our calling is to keep our focus on God. On the knowledge of his love for us, and the actions of Jesus Christ, our saviour and our redeemer.

If we keep God at the centre of our very being, we can't go far wrong.

† Pilgrims Together on Wednesdays on Zoom †


