Collect

First Reading

Acts 2.14a, 36-41

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them: ‘Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Therefore let the entire house of Israel know with certainty that God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified.’ Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and to the other apostles, ‘Brothers, what should we do?’ Peter said to them, ‘Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him.’ And he testified with many other arguments and exhorted them, saying, ‘Save yourselves from this corrupt generation.’ So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added.

Second Reading

I Peter 1.17-23

If you invoke as Father the one who judges all people impartially according to their deeds, live in reverent fear during the time of your exile. You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish. He was destined before the foundation of the world, but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake. Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are set on God. Now that you have purified your souls by your obedience to the truth so that you have genuine mutual love, love one another deeply from the heart. You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God.

Gospel Reading

Luke 24.13-35

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, ‘What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?’ They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, ‘Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?’ He asked them, ‘What things?’ They replied, ‘The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.’ Then he said to them, ‘Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?’ Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the

scriptures. As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Sermon by Revd. Nichola Winter on Second Sunday of Easter 16th April at Friston

Low Sunday has always seemed rather a sorry name for the second Sunday of Easter. It has somewhat cynically been said that the name reflects the low turnout in the congregation following the packed churches of last Sunday...and it was indeed a joy to welcome so many to the Easter celebration.

But Easter doesn't finish when the chocolate eggs have been eaten and the Easter flowers are starting to droop. One wise Christian has written, 'we are an Easter people' and indeed, without the hope brought about by the resurrection things would look very bleak.

Easter is traditionally a time for baptism. I recall an Easter morning on Dunwich beach in the late 80's when Bishop Eric carried out a baptism in the sea. Baptism means a dying to sin, a washing clean, a re-birth and a reclothing in the new life that Jesus promises. Holy Week includes

meditations on the seven words from the cross and one of them features the repentant thief who cries out to Jesus, 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.'

Remember me.

We ask Jesus to remember us – to take our life and re-order it, re-shape it, re-create it. Jesus' promise to the one who repents is almost astonishing – 'truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.' There can be no greater promise than this. One of the books I often read during Lent is 'Cross shattered Christ' by the American theologian Stanley Hauerwas, and in it he writes:

'To be with Jesus, to be claimed by Jesus to be his friend, is paradise, for Jesus is the kingdom of God, the kingdom of the crucified. We need to know no more than this. To be in paradise is to be 'with Jesus' – to be pulled into God's life by the love made visible on the cross. Our salvation is no more or no less than being made part of God's body, God's enfleshed memory, so that the world may know that we are redeemed from our fevered and desperate desire to insure we will not be forgotten.'

Re-membered, made whole by Jesus' death. What did this mean for Thomas – the disciple who claims our full sympathy and feeling? How often have we demanded signs and proofs before we will believe?

We need to thank God for Thomas. How often he put into words the doubts, the questions we all want to ask. He always seeks clarification; he wants the t's crossed and the i's dotted. Think back to the lovely passage in John's gospel where Jesus tells his disciples that they know the place where Jesus is going – and good old Thomas bursts out 'Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' And Jesus says to him, 'I am the way...' Thomas demands that it be spelt out so there can be no confusion. Jesus is the way.

But now, as Thomas meets up with the disciples again after the harrowing events of Easter they tell him an astonishing thing – they've seen the Lord. And don't forget, this is a week later. Thomas doesn't know what has happened. Where has he been all this time? What has he been thinking? In hiding out of fear? Scared that he will be the next to be taken prisoner – to stand trial? That 'not knowing' must have been agony. No mobile phone to keep in touch – no texting or e-mails of encouragement. He's on his own. He finally decides to catch up with his old companions – and they come out with this extraordinary news. We do not need to be amazed at

Thomas reaction. We do need to be grateful. His doubt, his questioning brings the answers – and the reassurance - that we seek. Not for nothing is Low Sunday also sometimes called ‘Thomas’ Easter’.

I sometimes think of the joy that Jesus must have felt – his love and concern for his friends must initially have been marred by Thomas' absence. But now his team is almost back in place. (I say almost, because, of course, they are short of one...) But Jesus knows that this is the team he is going to send out. His work on earth is almost over but for them the work is just beginning. We hear in the book of Acts how 'with great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all.'

And that work is now ours, too. We are called to give our testimony, to witness to the risen Christ, to be re-membered by our baptism so that we may be re- membered by Jesus in paradise.

May our Easter continue to be blessed and joyful and mat we take that blessing and joy to others in our encounters this week. We are an Easter people!

Church Wardens

As you are aware, our Church Wardens are the backbone of our churches in many ways. As you are also aware, we currently only have 3 (wonderful) wardens over the 4 parishes, when we should have 8.

As such, in Aldeburgh and Aldringham we are rethinking how we appoint and look after our Warden team. This year at our APCMs, I am proposing we adopt a new, 3 year rolling Warden scheme, which will go as follows:

Year 1: Deputy Warden (a year to learn the job and be trained by the more senior wardens. A non-official role).

Year 2: Church Warden (the year with most responsibility for the running of the church building, but assisted by the rest of the team).

Year 3: Senior Warden (there for advice, support and to train the deputy warden).

After 3 years, the warden steps down.

This scheme means that a larger team reduces time needed, pressure and stress from any one warden. It also means people get the training and support they need, and (also importantly), means that this is not an open-ended job. It is only a commitment for 3 years.

If we choose to adopt this scheme, we need to do so at the respective APCMs. Please could I ask electoral role members of these 2 parishes to think and pray about this decision, and come to the meetings ready to vote. If you have any queries about it, then please contact me before the meeting and we can have a conversation.

If the scheme goes well in Aldringham and Aldeburgh, we may consider adopting it for the other 2 parishes in the benefice next year.


