Collect

Father in heaven, whose Son Jesus Christ was wonderfully transfigured before chosen witnesses upon the holy mountain, and spoke of the exodus he would accomplish at Jerusalem: give us strength so to hear his voice and bear our cross that in the world to come we may see him as he is; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Daniel 7.9-10, 13-14

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne; his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence. A thousand thousand served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him. The court sat in judgement, and the books were opened. As I watched in the night visions, I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven. And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him. To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

Second Reading 2 Peter 1.16-19

For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts.

Gospel Reading Luke 9.28-36

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'-not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, lesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

Sermon by The Revd Sarah du Boulay, Eighth Sunday after Trinity, 30th July, at Aldeburgh

One of the great bonuses of having a curate is that while the curate is here for three years to learn and to shape who she is as a priest, she is also here to teach us. In the space of a month, I think we are already all learning from Mary. One of the things she has taught me (and the congregation at Knodishall last week) is about making unleavened bread. Unleavened bread as we know, is used to celebrate Passover, and also, according to the Canons of the Church of England, should be used to celebrate the Eucharist (wafers are also allowed!). Leavened bread is bread which is risen, and contains yeast. Unleavened bread does not contain yeast, and so is unrisen. So far so clear?

Now, the thing about yeast is that it is actually all around us – in the very air itself. So orthodox Jews have only 14 minutes between adding the water to their mixture and getting the dough into the oven if they want it to count as unleavened bread. Any longer than that and it will have caught too much wild yeast from the air to count as unleavened. 14 minutes! 14 minutes, and something so minute that we have no idea it is even around us has a massive effect on something that we can definitely see. And feel, and touch and taste...

So, a very little amount of yeast can raise a massive amount of bread. Likewise, a tiny mustard seed can one day become an enormous Mustard Shrub – much more tree-like than we may imagine. This, we are told, is like the kingdom of heaven. Something which starts off very small, but becomes more and more, and then provides sustenance of all who live by and in it and under it.

I'm taking this as a huge encouragement at the moment. We have been talking about how some things in the benefice are necessarily having to change, and we are already starting to see that change. The fact that we are all here this morning, worshipping together as a benefice for example. Our advertisement for a paid Centre Manager for the Fairfield Centre. The Evensong services at Aldringham. Our commitment to biodiversity in the Friston church yard. Knodishall getting ever closer to actually getting that toilet and kitchen in church! Small steps forward, each one of them, but goodness me could they have a big effect on what we do here. Each one counts towards the Kingdom of God here on earth, and each one counts towards that Revival which we have been praying for, for the last year. It may seem small, but if God can make such a big difference with a mustard seed, or with a tiny speck of wild yeast, then what more can he do with us? It's a question to which Jesus tells us the answer. But first he requires something from us. In the parables with the hidden treasure and the pearl, we see people finding out about the treasure – it is not immediately obvious, but it is there. And as soon as they recognise it, they joyfully sell everything to possess something of great value. Once we find out what the Kingdom of God is, is it not right that we joyfully buy into it? That we give ourselves, our lives, our possessions, 100% to be art of God's amazing plan? If we believe. If we truly believe, then how can we respond with anything less than 100%?

It's a lot to ask, but look at what we get in return. We are offered the promise of eternal life. With God our Creator and our Redeemer no less. Jesus tells us in his final parable that the Kingdom of Heaven is like a net thrown into the sea which catches every type of fish. When the net is drawn in, the fish are sorted – the good from the bad. An eschatological explanation of the end of time itself. Judgement day.

It all sounds rather terrifying and enormous and impossible if we look at it as a whole. But this is one reason why Jesus taught us the previous parables. Start small. Make good decisions and good steps with God as our focus, and see just what God can do with these small things. Small things grow. And grow. And grow.

And the other good news is that we are not left on our own to make this seemingly huge commitment. To live our lives according to God's word. The writer of Romans reminds us that "Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God."

We are a church of prayer. A benefice built on prayer. It's why we do daily morning prayer together in each parish. It's why we gather together to worship as a benefice. Because prayer is so incredibly important. Prayer guides us, sustains us, enables us, and we do it through the power of the Holy Spirit, so that even when we don't have the words of our own, God knows exactly what is in our hearts. Like the wild yeast which surrounds us – if we consciously surround ourselves with prayer, then great things can grow out of the smallest of things. And if each one of us is like a speck of wild yeast in the atmosphere – able to leaven a whole loaf of bread, then imagine what a whole packet of us can do together!
