Collect

Almighty God, whose only Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence: give us pure hearts and steadfast wills to worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Exodus 12.1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover

of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgements: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Second Reading Romans 13.8-end

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Gospel Reading Matthew 18.15-20

'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis, Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity, 3rd September at Aldringham

St Paul's letter to the Romans – today's Epistle – is a hard read. Or rather it is quite easy to read, but once you start meditating on the passage as a guide to life, it is far from simple. We say that Christians should follow Jesus: that is the briefest way of saying what a Christian is and does. Well, this passage from the bible tries to describe that following... at some length.

At a gathering full of Christians recently, I talked briefly to a person who had been involved in politics. In fact my wife introduced a Ukrainian to the person concerned along with information about the Ukrainian, namely that she had a family back at home, that she is working hard locally in a much-needed job for which she arrived highly trained, and that she's sending money back to that war-torn country. The sole response was only one question: 'Is she going to stay?' Is that how we react to refugees? End of conversation....fetch a sandwich; talk to someone else.

In my bible, the chapter in the letter to the Romans has the title 'the new life in Christ' and then the section is called 'marks of the True Christian'. And it is very specific. In relation to the story which I have just told, it has a passage concerning love and what love really means: rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer... and then 'extend hospitality to strangers'. That means, among others, refugees and all those in need.

Not of course, just Ukrainians. When I was a proper vicar in a market town in Lincolnshire, we had quite a stream of people who wandered the streets and who knocked at the door looking for food and also for a few words of company: people sometimes called 'gentlemen of the road'. It was great for our children to meet so many interesting people out of the blue.

What is love? Well, it is all sorts of things and everyone knows about 'love stories' of the inter-personal kind, which can be easily told and they sell well; that's great! But love does need unpacking as something which is of crucial importance to the person who has made a decision to follow Jesus Christ. And so St Paul has a go, in some detail and with specifics. There seem to be two key messages in his letter.

The first is 'rejoice with those who rejoice' and then there is 'weep with those who weep'. Rejoicing with those who rejoice is fine at times but not always easy: those wonderful moments of humour and festival when all is right with the world and we may even get an insight into what heaven is like. How crucial it is to do some rejoicing, especially for those who feel that the world is on nothing other than a slippery slope: things getting worse before they get worse still. Rejoicing: not by patronising people, but the innocent sharing of people's joy however that is expressed.

'Weep with those who weep'. In a way, that may sound surprising. Should we not be more detached and helpful, more pastoral? Should you say: 'Well, look at all those people who are worse off than you'? Or: 'Every cloud has a silver lining; you'll be OK.' But no. The guidance is not to say 'Oh dear, there there, poor you'. In fact it is not really to say anything; it is to be there. And that follows the way of Jesus. People want Jesus to have a said more things and to have spoken out more precisely: telling them how to live better. I have a cartoon which I cherish: it is of Jesus ascending into heaven, with his disciples down below and saying 'Don't go Jesus; we need more specifics on how to run the Church'. Jesus did bring his teaching, but also his presence, as a participant. He brings life in his own person.

I once visited a mortuary with the parents of a mother who had died together with her children. I said a prayer, but only being there and weeping really made any sense.

It is too easy to talk of Christianity being about love. St Paul writes of the love of Christians in practice. What does that mean? He mentions many ways in which love is practised: do not seek revenge, be patient, be constant in prayer, remembering God's presence. I was passing Aldeburgh church recently and quite near the entrance was one of those endless diversion signs which you see everywhere... pointing in random, often meaningless, directions. I was darkly tempted to change the sign so that it pointed neither to left nor to right but upwards to heaven: diversion to enable us to find what is most important: up to Jesus ... follow him.

St Paul is right in, as it were, changing the direction signs so that they point upwards and therefore in an unlikely direction. Bless those who persecute you; associate with the lowly; live peaceably with all; if your enemies are hungry, feed them. Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. Do not claim to wiser than you are...maybe that is aimed at preachers who make out that they have a special insight.

There is, of course, no way of summing up all the teaching and example of Jesus. We have to read and pray...reflect on life while experiencing it. Look at Jesus' response to St Peter when Peter rebuked him. Jesus had told his followers that he would suffer at the hand of the powers of the land and be killed. That was the consequence of Jesus' love, of standing up for the truth..... with the apostles now informed for the first time about what was to come. If one were to summarize that teaching from Paul's letter to the Romans, I reckon that 'overcome evil with good' is at the core, along with 'rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep'. Christian love follows Jesus and takes us out of ourselves. That is how love becomes genuine.
