Collect

God, who in generous mercy sent the Holy Spirit upon your Church in the burning fire of your love: grant that your people may be fervent in the fellowship of the gospel that, always abiding in you, they may be found steadfast in faith and active in service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Exodus 14.19-end

The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night. Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, 'Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt.' Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers.' So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned

to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Second Reading Romans 14.1-12

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarrelling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgement on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgement on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honour of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honour of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honour of the Lord and give thanks to God. We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgement on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgement seat of God. For it is written, 'As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God.' So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

Gospel Reading Matthew 18.21-35

Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. 'For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to

him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything." And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow-slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, "Pay what you owe." Then his fellow-slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you." But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he should pay the debt. When his fellow-slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, "You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow-slave, as I had mercy on you?" And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he should pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.'

Sermon by Revd Nichola Winter, Fourteenth Sunday after Trinity, I 0th September at Aldeburgh

God is a God of second chances. Since early biblical times, God has allowed humans the opportunity to turn, to rethink, to start again. God is more ready to hear than we to pray. If only we can take time out from our busy lives and reassess just where we really are; what action we need to take - and lay all that before God, awaiting his response; his direction; his grace.

As the new academic year begins in schools and colleges we might all be thinking about 'new beginnings'. The onset of autumn seems to do that. The best executors of education policy are those who focus on giving children building blocks - the basic skills that will enable enquiring minds to develop powers of reasoning, analysis and imagination - to equip the young people so that they can realise fully their potential.

God wants no less for each one of us. Sin is divisive. It cuts us off from our fellow human beings and it cuts us off from God. God wants to enter into a full and meaningful relationship with us so that we can grow in his love and grace. He wants us to get on with our fellow human beings, too. That's not always easy, and as we view the turmoil of world events we might feel despair at what goes on. But we are called to live in peace.

We need also to be awake and watchful; it is so easy to grow complacent, to bumble along from day to day. But salvation is near - the night is far gone and day is near. It's always later than we might think. A friend, rediagnosed with a vicious form of cancer told me last week that she has declined any more treatment, having been told it would add little to her span of life. She's young - and yet she sees her life coming to an end sooner than one might think fair. Still, she sees her salvation coming from God. Whether or not each one of us is threatened with a terminal illness. involved in a fatal car accident or victim of a natural disaster, we all move towards the end at the same rate - one day at a time. It's later than we think. The widow of a former bishop wrote once about an earthquake in New Zealand - but her words might equally apply to those affected by many crises: 'The earthquake (or hurricane) was perhaps the ultimate determining moment in my life. It made me ask much more fundamental questions of God than I had ever asked before: Why am I still here? What is my life about?"

The Hebrews didn't have time to ponder this question. They were to eat the passover lamb hurriedly, loins girded, sandals on feet, staff in hand. They were to mark the doorposts with the lambs blood and the Lord would pass over them, saving them from destruction. No time to hang about if they wanted to be saved.

Today we don't have to go through such rushed preparations. We remember the final sacrifice that Jesus made for us when we approach the altar. The grace of God is given freely to us; a consequence of the faith of the Hebrews and, years later, fulfilled in the sacrifice of Jesus. Where two or three are gathered together, Jesus is in their midst.

The early Celts took a view on this... they viewed each day as an opportunity in which to lay their praise and worship on the altar of life - to offer it all up to God because, ultimately, that was the most important thing in life; that recognition that God is the supreme mover - creator, redeemer and sustainer in whom we live and move and have our being.

The reading from Exodus brings us the story of the first passover for the Israelites; the roots for our eucharist celebration today:

"This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance."

Our sharing of holy communion is a perpetual ordinance; a sign of alignment with God, thanksgiving for the salvation we receive through the shedding of the blood of his Son and an indication of our readiness to walk in the light of eternity - that turning from works of darkness to the armour of light, as advocated by Paul in his letter to the Romans.

As we contemplate new autumn beginnings we can be mindful that each of us moves towards the same end; we pray that we may reach that end whole and complete, as the person God longs for us to be. We need his healing, mercy and grace and we seek all of those by immersing ourselves in his word, accepting the strength he offers and obeying his command to love with all our heart. As we pray at Morning Prayer, 'the night is passed and the day lies open before us...' - we pray that we be made whole by the love of God and enabled to bring that healing to those we call neighbour, friend, brother. As Julian of Norwich said, 'Love was his meaning...' and 'He who made man for love, will by that same love restore him to his former blessedness - and yet more.'

Love was indeed his meaning. May the meaning and love of God fill each one of us, this day and every day.

Keep, O Lord, your Church, with your perpetual mercy; and, because without you our human frailty cannot but fall, keep us ever by your help from all things hurtful, and lead us to all things profitable to our salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
