Collect

Almighty Father, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the King of all: govern the hearts and minds of those in authority, and bring the families of the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to his just and gentle rule; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading

Wisdom of Solomon 6:12-16

Wisdom is radiant and unfading, and she is easily discerned by those who love her, and is found by those who seek her. She hastens to make herself known to those who desire her. One who rises early to seek her will have no difficulty, for she will be found sitting at the gate. To fix one's thought on her is perfect understanding, and one who is vigilant on her account will soon be free from care, because she goes about seeking those worthy of her, and she graciously appears to them in their paths, and meets them in every thought.

Second Reading

I Thessalonians 4.13-end

But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

Gospel Reading Matthew 25.1-13

'Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, "Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves." And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, "Lord, lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly I tell you, I do not know you." Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

Sermon by Revd Sarah du Boulay, Fourth Sunday before Advent/All Saints Day, 5th November at Friston

During a few days when we maybe think about death more than usual, with Halloween, All Saints Day and All Souls Day happening in quick succession, the Bible readings we have heard today are exceedingly powerful. All speak of how God has ultimately overcome death. About how God himself is our Saviour. How in God's kingdom, there is no more death, no more disease, no more suffering, no more pain, – God himself is our Salvation... in these readings, we learn exactly what eternal life in God's kingdom looks like.

The whole point about death, as a Christian, is that it brings new life. Eternal life.

But in this lifetime, death can all too often feel like it's a final ending – we no longer see, smell, hear or touch loved ones who have died. We remember them. We reverently dispose of their bodies, and we treasure their memories. But they are no longer physically here with us. It's tough. It's really tough. Death is such a hard thing to deal with – for professionals who have to deal with it every day, through to a child experiencing for the first time the death of a pet. One minute a living, breathing person or animal is here. The next – they're gone. Something that looks like them remains, but their essence – the thing that animates them, that makes them, them – is gone. Lost.

Grief, it is said, is the price paid for loving (I have been using this quote for a long time, but have only recently found out that it is attributed to her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II). We love, therefore we grieve. I agree with this to a certain extent — but as Christians, I think we are looking at the statement upside down. Grief is not the guaranteed result of love. Death is not inevitable. Without love, we would not grieve, absolutely. Grief can only follow love. But that is slightly different to saying it will always follow love.

Am I making sense? As Christians, who know the Gospel story, who know that Jesus died and was raised back to life by God, who know that in this sacrifice and resurrection, God proved once and for all that He is the Almighty – that love overcomes evil – that life overcomes death – we know that death is not, in fact, the final ending.

We know, that we have been promised salvation – and that salvation is life eternal in the presence of God himself – our creator, our redeemer, our Lord. It's breath-taking. And this promise – this invitation, is open to absolutely everyone who ever lived, is living, and ever will live.

It can take ones breath away, can't it? The enormity of what we are hearing.

It's a story we have heard, time and time again, and sometimes it can feel like it loses it's power. But I want to remind you just what a huge promise this is. So go on – take a second. Think about what the promise of heaven – the actuality of your redemption – the fact that death is not the final word, means to you. In your life. With your experiences and relationships.

We all know that last week was Halloween. And some people here will know that Hallow in Old English means 'holy' or 'sacred'. Therefore, Hallow's Eve, or Halloween, simply means the evening of Holy Persons – the evening before All Saints Day. We remember the saints and allow the memory of their faith to spur us on to deeper worship and greater service to the Lord.

On Thursday, we extended our remembrances to all who have died, irrespective of faith, gender, race, and we prayed specifically for people known to and loved by us.

But today we celebrate All Saint's Day itself, which is a yearly reminder of our connectedness as Christians to the Church. We remember all the faithful people who have gone before us – who have studied scripture, who have preached, who have prayed and shared their faith, and worshipped – many of them in this building here...

We remember that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. These bricks are soaked in the prayers of people who lived and died before we were even born. Who believed what we believe. We're not just remembering the official Church saints – we are remembering today that the Bible tells us all who believe and trust in Christ, are saints. That makes me a saint. It makes you a saint. It makes many of us here, saints. The invitation is open to all.

It reminds us that these saints are experiencing the promise of God we have just spoken about. These saints are currently in God's presence, worshipping him forever alongside the angels. Where God has wiped away suffering, and death doesn't mean a thing.

Today is a day of great hope. It's a reminder of the resurrection – not just of Jesus, but also of Lazarus – an everyman who was brought back to life by Jesus himself – a sign that Jesus was God, and completed miracles as God and in God's name. And if Lazarus can overcome death, in the name of God

- that means the promise is for all of us, too. After we die in this life, we also will continue to live - both in God's kingdom of heaven, and in memory, here on earth.

We are stronger together – all the saints in eternity, loving and praising and praying and worshipping. Eternal life doesn't start when we leave this earthly life. It starts when we come to know and love Jesus. So make the most of it – the rest of your eternal life starts today!
