Collect

Eternal Father, whose Son Jesus Christ ascended to the throne of heaven that he might rule over all things as Lord and King: keep the Church in the unity of the Spirit and in the bond of peace, and bring the whole created order to worship at his feet; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading

Ezekiel 34.11-16, 20-24

For thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice. Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep. I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the Lord, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the Lord, have spoken.

Second Reading Ephesians 1.15-end

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love towards all the saints, and for this reason. I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Gospel Reading Matthew 25.31-end

'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'

Sermon by Revd Celia Cook - Second Sunday before Advent, 19th November at Aldeburgh

I have always found it a shocking statistic that we have enough food in the world to feed everyone 3 times over and yet every day, according to the United Nations, 25,000 people including more than 10,000 children die from hunger and related causes.

Somehow, we are not managing or sharing our world's resources wisely. And it comes at a cost. For many it simply isn't enough of a priority. Either through inaction or self- interest, there is insufficient investment in the things, which would re-right the dishonest scales and enable everyone in God's loving creation to flourish and live lives to the full. Those in authority of course bear the bigger burden, as they have the power to promote change locally, nationally and globally. The priorities, which they set out, determine a nation's expenditure of time, effort and money. The power, which they wield, controls the lives of people within their communities whether for good or ill.

The Pharisees as the religious and political leaders within their communities held huge control, not only over the religious practices but the legal and moral codes and therefore how people lived their lives. They had the power to promote change. God had entrusted them with his message of love and reconciliation to the world. But they had chosen to ignore this and had used his commandments for their own ends: with legal requirements, which were impossible to keep, misinterpreting His word to justify excluding and distancing the poor and the marginalised – the very people to whom God wanted them to reach out. They were too busy feathering their own nests to invest in God's message of equality.

And so in response, as always, Jesus told them a story. A master goes away and leaves his slaves in charge of his property. He gives them differing amounts of money according to their ability. When he returns, the 2 slaves with the largest amounts have doubled his investment. The 3rd slave hides his money and therefore only has the same amount to show his master. The master congratulates the first two slaves. The third slave is thrown out.

On the surface these parables in Matthew's gospels appear quite harsh and unforgiving. I have always had a little sympathy for the slave who is given the least amount of money. I wonder whether he was disappointed that his master felt he was only capable of handling such a small amount. Perhaps he was overwhelmed with the task. After all, it's so much easier to make money when you have a lot to begin with. The other slaves had a head start with twice or even five times as much money to play with. All this slave's success was hanging on the one small investment. You can't blame him in a way for becoming frozen with fear.

But Jesus' message to the Pharisees is clear. God had left them in charge of his people, as shepherds of the flock. The positions, which they held were a gift and a privilege. And they had a responsibility to use these gifts according to God's will, not their own. It was not up to them to decide whether or how to respond. They had all the guidance they needed in the scriptures and through God's Spirit. There was no excuse either for inaction or self-interest.

The slaves were entrusted with an amount according to their ability. There was no reason to be frozen with fear. The master knew what they were capable of and didn't expect miracles. So he is quite satisfied when the first two slaves simply double their money. He doesn't expect them all to make ten talents. Two would have been enough for the slave who was given just one amount to begin with.

Everyone is called to account for the stewardship of what they are given – money, possessions, time, skills.

I think sometimes we are overwhelmed with the task of serving God and our neighbour. I certainly feel that in my work for the NHS. As the only mental health chaplain ministering in the inpatient units across Suffolk, I often feel pulled in many directions and question whether I have enough resources in every sense to fulfil my role. There is a danger of inaction or over-action; neither of which is healthy. So my daily prayer is always to do what I can each day with what I have available:

What I can, with what I have.

God has made us and given us all different gifts and abilities. He knows what we're capable of and will not ask us to produce 10 times what we

have been given in the first place. So we need to be careful not to take on more than we are able or called to do; at work at home or even at church, however much we might feel it is expected of us. After all, we may get in the way of someone eager to use their gifts too, who doesn't, because they think they're not needed.

We also need to guard against inaction: another simple phrase, which I find helpful - 'never withhold a kindness if it's in our charge'.

We mustn't be put off by other's abilities and what they seem able to achieve. We may well be the little boy whose meagre loaves and fishes become a feast for thousands, but the chances are, our small efforts will result in small yet equally valuable rewards within our community.

What gifts has God given you?

Have you hidden them in the ground, thinking they wouldn't be worth anything to anyone else?

Or have you run yourself into the ground or become distracted by a task that isn't yours to fulfil?

Let's do what we can with what we have this week – no more and no less. Let's serve willingly and sensibly, in confidence that God will bless the work of our hands and the prayers on our hearts. Amen.
