Collect

Almighty God, you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and for ever.

First Reading Proverbs 8.1, 22-31

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth- when he had not yet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race.

Second Reading Colossians 1.15-20

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Gospel Reading

John 1.1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Sermon by Revd Nichola Winter - Fourth Sunday of Epiphany/Candlemas at Knodishall 28th January

As a child, I recall thinking it very odd that the local church where I went to Sunday school always kept its Christmas tree in place until February. The claim that the church continued to celebrate Christmas long after the rest of us had removed festive decorations seemed like trying to have too much of a good thing. The outside world had long since returned to secular worries, a new school term had started and the cheerful mood of Christmas seemed to have evaporated.

But Candlemas marks the end of the Epiphany season. It falls forty days after the feast of the nativity - and was the time at which a new mother would be expected to undergo ritual purification. Candlemas has been long celebrated by Christians - records of it date back to the fourth century; and symbols relating to it have been significant in secular, agricultural and legal quarters. At Candlemas, cattle would be moved out from the meadows that were to be ploughed ready for spring sowing. In the Celtic church, St Brigid was remembered on this day - a figure linked to the blessing of wells, springs and the household hearth - a reminder of the duty of households to welcome strangers and offer hospitality. In Scotland, Candlemas used to be one of the quarter days on which rents were paid and certain contracts renegotiated. Generally it was a time of reckoning - of taking stock and re-assessing. A time of new beginnings.

One of the greatest symbols linked to Candlemas is that of light. The name comes from the tradition of the priest blessing beeswax candles that would be used in the church throughout the year. In the Armenian church, the custom was to light candles on the eve of the feast and carry them out into the darkness - a symbolic bringing of light into the void. These lights would then be taken to the homes of the faithful - a reminder of the Christ child who would become the light of those who walked in darkness. It was this recognition of Jesus as the one who was to fulfil the promise of the prophets that forms the backbone of the story from Luke, read today. In the weeks before Christmas we lit candles on the Advent wreath, one of which represented the prophets - those figures in history who looked forward to the coming of the Messiah. On this day, as Joseph and Mary arrived at the temple with their Son, two faithful servants of God recognised Jesus as the one who would be the expected Messiah who would bring redemption, not just for the people of Jerusalem and Israel - but for all peoples, a task that continues to be work for us today.

It may feel strange to us that, on this day, we suddenly return to a story about the infancy of Jesus. During Epiphany the gospel readings have taken us on a journey exploring the nature of Christ and how he reveals himself as the Son of God. First there was his baptism - his earthly cleansing by John, but also the alighting of the Holy Spirit and declaration that here was the beloved Son of God. Then we had the story of Nathaniel and the first disciples, followed by the wedding at Cana - a story of human celebration and festivity but with the added wonder of the first of the divine signs that would become a key factor in the ministry of Jesus. Each of these gives us a sense of how the humanity of Jesus will find a revelation that points us to God, the heavenly Father.

So it is with Simeon and Anna. At last, after years of waiting, they see in this small child the sign they have been waiting and praying for. It must have been a marvellous, wondrous moment for them - this moment of recognition, a fulfilling of the expectation and anticipation they had held for so long. And like so many eagerly awaited events, it probably didn't happen in the way they had expected. Simeon's encounter with the Holy Spirit, when he was told that he wouldn't experience death before he had seen the Messiah, probably didn't prepare him for the fact that when that revelation came it would come in the shape and person of - a young baby. That fragility, that vulnerability, that weakness - most of us have only to encounter a tiny child to be overtaken with feelings of protection, wonder and love. But recognition of a Messiah? That might be more of a challenge.

And yet, here it is. The promise fulfilled; the salvation revealed. In a baby. Simeon is not going to see the end of the story of salvation just yet. God doesn't always work in that way. His time is not our time. He will do things when his time is right - we can receive God's promises but we cannot dictate the exact way in which those promises will be fulfilled. We may have a long journey to undertake first. Even Mary, the mother of Christ, who will already have experienced so many wonderful things in

relation to this amazing child, still has a long way to go. Simeon's warning must have cast a shadow over her - 'a sword will pierce your own soul, too.' What parent does not experience the pains as well as the joys of parenthood?

But here is the child Jesus, being brought to the temple as part of the purification ritual. Not for the first time, Jesus is subject to human law. Human law that will play such a crucial part in his ministry to us as he allows himself to share our humanity. Only by being completely human and demonstrating an alignment with the world will he be able in due course to bring redemption and salvation. The wonder of God made man is that it's not a kind of quick fix - it has to be worked out in God's own time, and by God's good grace. This does not mean that we need only sit back and wait for it to happen. Far from it. What is crucial is our response to God and to this child, His Son.

This brings us to the well known words uttered by Simeon and used by us as the Gospel canticle at night prayer and also at many funeral services. We affirm our entrusting of ourselves - and the deceased - to the love and peace of God. The words of the Nunc dimittis speak of completion and fulfilment; indeed they are a song of rejoicing and an affirmation of faith. In some churches they are connected with the renewal of religious vows; they might even be described as one of the first mission statements - a recognition of the need to bring the light of Christ to all peoples. So they have become a song - a prayer - in which we entrust ourselves to God. Come Lord, into our lives, and work your way in us. We may not always understand why things are revealed to us in strange ways - a tiny babe for a Messiah; a sword that pierces the heart rather than a balm that soothes the soul, but we recognise that God sends His Son into the world and that salvation will come by Him. We offer ourselves to be used in whatever way God chooses; take our humanity, we pray, and use it as you will, that we, too, may become pointers to your salvation and witnesses to your glorious light.

Post Communion

God our creator, by your gift the tree of life was set at the heart of the earthly paradise, and the bread of life at the heart of your Church: may we who have been nourished at your table on earth be transformed by the glory of the Saviour's cross and enjoy the delights of eternity; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
