Collect

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ fasted forty days in the wilderness, and was tempted as we are, yet without sin: give us grace to discipline ourselves in obedience to your Spirit; and, as you know our weakness, so may we know your power to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Genesis 9.8-17

Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, 'As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.' God said, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth.' God said to Noah, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth.'

Second Reading

I Peter 3.18-end

For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight people, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you-not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Gospel Reading Mark 1.9-15

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.' And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him. Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

Sermon by Revd Celia Cook Sunday next before Lent at Aldeburgh 11th February

There's nothing like a mountain top experience to be inspired and exhilarated. When we lived in Colorado we spent a lot of time in the Rockies. Whether skiing in winter or hiking and sailing in summer, we were always refreshed and restored by the mountain air, beautiful views and the extraordinary flora and fauna, often with majestic elk and moose grazing just feet away from the trails.

Of course, you don't need to be a mile or more above sea level to benefit from a climb. For those of you who know North Norfolk, even Beeston Bump – a very odd hilly mound only 63 metres high on the coastal path next to Sheringham, has spectacular views of the surrounding countryside and sea.

Being high up elevates not just our bodies but our spirits too, and even though we know God isn't 'up there' and we're 'down here' it's difficult not to feel closer to him as a result.

As we rise above the clamour of our daily existence and breathe in the fresh spacious air, there's a sense of restoration, which then prepares us to descend and return again to the daily round.

Mountains were holy places for the Israelites.

It was on a mountain that Moses was given the 10 commandments. The covenant was sealed there. Pilgrims ascended to Jerusalem the Temple mount, to offer worship and praise to God.

The mountain was a place of the new covenant for Jesus too with the transfiguration and the mount of crucifixion.

Whether it was the Galilean hills or Gethsemane, if Jesus wanted to pray, to feel close to his Father, the best place was a high place.

In the gospel reading today, we find the disciples both exhilarated and terrified by their mountain experience. Peter, James and John perhaps thought they were being taken somewhere quiet and unchallenging: away from the crowds. But they were soon gripped with fear when a lowhanging cloud overwhelmed them. As Jesus' face and clothes become a dazzling white, they see him talking with 2 of the greatest prophets, Moses and Elijah. And when Peter impulsively suggests they set up camp together, God suddenly intervenes, telling them all to look to Jesus, His beloved Son and listen to him.

As we find ourselves on the eve of the Lenten season this week, we have the gentle liturgical reminder to take time out to ascend and find our own mountaintop, where we can listen more attentively to God's voice. Our lives will always benefit from a spiritual injection of fresh mountain air; a little more time to pray, to meditate, to read; to allow God in to transform us, so we can look forward with hope in the knowledge that Jesus is our way, our truth and our life.

I wonder what that might look like for you?

We may relish a mile high climb in the Rockies: or we may just have the energy for 63m walk up Beeston Bump. Whatever it is that will feed our souls, there is always something that will shape and hone us so we are better able to flourish: a place to re-set the compass on our life's journey.

Maybe it's finding a spiritual book or podcast to follow and reflect upon in the coming 6 weeks. I always heartily recommend Evelyn Underhill's classic book on Lent but there are many others old and new. We can share ideas over coffee today after the service.

If music helps you find a prayerful place, St Martin's in the Fields has much profound musical liturgy available on its website and St Martin's Voices provide the music for the Church of England's daily prayer app. This is a wonderful way to feel connected to fellow pilgrims across the Anglican communion, with morning and evening prayer throughout the liturgical year.

Lark Rise Retreats in Felixstowe is a new venture set up by 2 priests in our diocese. It offers guided opportunities to walk, talk and pray. Closer to home, Sarah our vicar and Mary our curate are both offering prayerful meditative groups each week through Lent.

If leaving home is a struggle for you, why not simply agree to pray with a friend weekly. One of the most spiritually enriching experiences I have had in my life was joining a prayer partnership scheme in my home church. About 20 of us signed up and committed to meet fortnightly in pairs to pray for ourselves and for others. Lifelong friendships were forged and faith strengthened and renewed.

Whatever you feel led to do, be encouraged that our God is a loving God who accompanies us faithfully as we tread whether tentatively or bravely along life's uncertain paths. We have no guarantee of an easy future. But we do know that if we take time to listen, Jesus will be our guardian and our guide on the way ahead.

Lord God, you have renewed us with the living bread from heaven; by it you nourish our faith, increase our hope, and strengthen our love: teach us always to hunger for him who is the true and living bread, and enable us to live by every word that proceeds from out of your mouth; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
