Collect

Almighty God, you show to those who are in error the light of your truth, that they may return to the way of righteousness: grant to all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's religion, that they may reject those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Genesis 17.1-7, 15-16

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, 'I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous.' Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, 'As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. God said to Abraham, 'As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her.'

Second Reading Romans 4.13-end

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null, and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')-in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore, his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised lesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Gospel Reading Mark 8.31-end

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

Sermon by Revd Sarah du Boulay First Sunday of Lent at Aldringham 18th February

When we talk about the story of Noah and the flood, it is easy to slip into a very comfortable state. We know the story. We teach it to children. We play with toys which represent the characters and the story. And there may be two interpretations with which we are equally comfortable.

One, is a story about God's love. We may remember that God loves animals and loves people and sent the rainbow to remind us of this. It is rather comforting and is the interpretation we often see in Children's Bibles.

The second interpretation is rather darker. In a fit of rage, God destroys everything that he has made because he is so angered by human rebellion. Definitely not for children. The comedian Eddie Izzard once described it as the 'Etch-a-Sketch ending of the world'. Do you remember Etch-a-Sketches? The old children's toy where you drew a picture then shook it and the picture disappeared ready to be redrawn...

Of course, there is some truth in both of these, but neither tells us any way near the whole story. A more full story is that throughout history, humankind has made decisions which distances us from the God who created us. Bad decisions. Sinful decisions. Selfish, violent, unloving decisions. Decisions which create and reflect disharmony within the world. Throughout the Bible, we are shown time and time again the myriad of different ways in which God has called us back to him – arms wide open. The story of the Great Flood is perhaps one of the most dramatic of these.

The story of human sinfulness begins in Genesis 3. Disharmony intensifies in chapter 4 (including the murder of a brother), then, in chapter 5, we are reminded of the lineage from Adam to Noah – the downward spiral of humankind through the generations. But it is in chapter 6 that God's harmonious world is broken. So broken, that we read that 'God was sorry that he had made humankind on earth and it grieved him to his heart' (verse 6), just before our reading began today.

What is amazing, is God's reaction to this destruction and sin. His response is not anger or revenge. It is sorrow and grief. The flood is not sent out of a need for revenge or wanton destruction. It is sent as a means of recreation. The Etch-a-Sketch ending of the world is not realised. He does not destroy everything and walk away. He washes the earth clean, and begins to re-create. We can see this through some direct parallels with the original creation story:

- That which God pronounced good in chapter I, he now pronounces evil.
- The separation of the waters in chapter I is first undone and then redone.
- God's command to 'be fruitful and multiply' is repeated 3 times after the flood.
- That human beings are created in the image of God is repeated.

It is important to remember that this is not a new beginning — it is a continuation. A new opportunity for us to live as God intended. Yet another chance for us.

Once again, God enters into a covenant with humankind without requiring anything in return. The flood has not suddenly, magically made everything better. The flood has not eradicated all sin from the world. God knows this. And yet he enters into this covenant anyway. The earth, all of creation is washed clean and given another chance.

This theme is echoed in our other readings today by the mention of baptism. Baptism is the celebration of our being washed clean from sin and welcomed by God. It is something so pure and so important that even Jesus – the only perfect human to have ever lived – chose to be baptised. A symbol of God's unending, all-purveying, all-encompassing love. He will seek and seek us and offer us time and time again that chance to be with him, in harmony and in holistic being, as we were created to be.

The story of the flood is a story of redemption, which echoes throughout the Bible, and is what we are looking towards during Lent. The story of lesus dying once for all upon the cross, for the salvation of the world.

When I worked as a youth worker, my vicar used to say that living with God was like crossing the road as a child, in the company of an adult. The adult would hold the child's hand to keep it safe, and no matter how hard the child tried, they would not be able to squirm their way out of the adult's grip. And so it is with God. Our Creator and our Redeemer. Who always receives us with open arms. Who loves us without transaction. Whose grace is enough. Is more than enough. Who washes us clean from sin, clean from blemish and promises to continue to love us. God will never give up on us. That's the message that I take from the story of Noah and the Flood.

Almighty God, you see that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves: keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
