Collect

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Exodus 20.1-17

Then God spoke all these words: I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments. You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work-you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it. Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.

Second Reading | Corinthians 1.18-25

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.' Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Gospel Reading John 2.13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the moneychangers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews then said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis Second Sunday of Lent at Knodishall 25th February

The news. Actually, it may not be much worse than usual, but it does appear worse, as disasters are news. It also seems bad, because we have a longing that somehow things should be better. Deep inside us, there may be a vision of a better world where mercy and happiness rule. Someone could come along and sort it all out – the longing for great leaders or for fairy godmothers.

The same kind of expectations are often expressed elsewhere whether it's a new neighbour or a better prime minister. Would it not be wonderful if... and then of course they are not quite what you had hoped for.

The same longing and the same disappointments were true at the time of Jesus. Times may have been different (just as bad; probably worse), but people were much the same. This Sunday's Gospel is from St Mark, and you could say that the whole of St Mark's Gospel is about the longing for someone to come and sort everything out, along with the consequence of discovering that Jesus was not going to do so - or at least not in the hoped-for way.

Roughly the first half of the Mark's Gospel is about Jesus as a powerful figure who did wonderful things. Here were signs of the Kingdom of God, for he brought healing to the sick, bread to the people and clear teaching for all. But the puzzle was to know who on earth he was. It is as if the question asked in the first half of the Gospel was: 'who could do all these things?' And the answer: 'maybe he's the Messiah'. Then in the centre of the Gospel comes a kind of pivot point. Part of it is just before today's Gospel passage, when Jesus asks his disciples 'Who do people say that I am?' They say maybe he is John the Baptist or perhaps one of the prophets. Peter then has one of his better moments and says: 'You are the Messiah' - that is, the one who brings salvation.

I expect that the disciples thought at the time that it would all be wonderful from there on - as we often do when a new leader appears. Jesus was the answer; he would waive the wand and all would be well. The sick healed, the people fed, probably... the Romans out.

But there is another half of the Gospel of Mark still to come and it's very different. Few healings, rather little public ministry, much time spent with the disciples themselves. And all ushered in by that second and equally important exchange with Peter, who takes Jesus aside and says that surely Jesus must not suffer and die. Jesus replies with blistering severity: 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things'.

The second part of the Gospel of Mark could be described as a kind of commentary on those two great exchanges between Jesus and Peter. For the disciples and everyone else had longed for a spectacular saviour who would bring victory and success. It was the hardest of all the lessons.... for them to learn that salvation came by a different route: through identifying with the suffering of the world, through taking its sins and agonies on his shoulders, and thereby challenging all to do likewise. Then at Easter, showing that it is out of the very middle of suffering and death that new life is given.

Even after those years of tuition, the disciples still didn't get it. Look at Peter at the time of crucifixion. Look at those two on the road to Emmaus. It took the fact of the Cross, the risen Lord, the Holy Spirit, before eyes were opened.

I think that Christians have to be very conscious of those two halves of Mark's Gospel, those two conversations between Jesus and Peter. Especially for Lent, it is teaching that Mark puts across so clearly - more clearly than the other Gospels. Perhaps I can give some examples. Starting with each of us as individuals. How do we follow in the way of Mark's Gospel? The values of the world in which we live, are almost all to do with preserving, securing and enriching our lives in the world. But following Christ is very different, for it rates other matters highly: risk in the service of God, insecurity, not feathering your nest. An interesting test (in Jesus' time as now) is how we rate success, in ourselves or in others. Jesus says: 'those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it' (Mk 8;35). That comes in Mark just after Peter had told Jesus that he should not suffer. How do you rate success? Whom do you rate as a success? How does your rating compare with that of Jesus?

And where do we look for hope and new life in our own lives? Perhaps we suffer from loneliness or from anger. The message from Mark's Gospel is that there, in the darkest parts of our lives, is exactly where God works on new life. And the same is true of institutions of which the Church is one, but there are hundreds of others. Few, indeed hardly any, institutions would say that they follow Jesus. But there is a public expectation that they adhere to at least some of the values which he demonstrated in his life. So if they have squandered their pension funds or if they treat the people whom they employ without compassion, it is rightly held against them.

Then the wider world. I started by speaking of the news and the way in which we all sigh ...and hope for new leaders with quick solutions. But the lesson from Mark is that hope and glory is to be found by those prepared to share the despair ...and in the very middle of the most hopeless situations, to see hope and love. The cross then the tomb were the context for the resurrection. And if we wish to see where Jesus is most hopefully present today, perhaps we should look not at some startling success story where everyone is bouncing around and having a good time, but rather at quiet work which identifies with those in need, and seeks for signs of life in work with the homeless or with refugees.

The Lenten message from Mark's Gospel is that Jesus, in his person, was re-shaping the whole idea of what a Saviour is. Mark's short sharp Gospel makes this point very clearly. Here was the Messiah, yet his true significance could only be seen in his life, his death and his resurrection.
