Collect

Almighty Father, who in your great mercy gladdened the disciples with the sight of the risen Lord: give us such knowledge of his presence with us, that we may be strengthened and sustained by his risen life and serve you continually in righteousness and truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Zephaniah 3.14-end

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has taken away the judgements against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord.

Second Reading Acts 3.12-19

When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, 'You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you. 'And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out.

Gospel Reading Luke 24.36b-48

While they were talking about this, lesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you-that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis – Second Sunday of Easter, 7th April at Friston

The Annunciation to Mary: when the angel Gabriel was sent by God to Mary who was told that she will bear a son whom she will name Jesus. We would normally be celebrating the Annunciation on 25th March, but that date fell in Holy Week this year, so the celebration was postponed to the Sunday after Easter.

Here, in St Luke's Gospel, is the person of Mary responding to God's call, hesitant at first but then speaking in straightforward terms: 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be according to your word.' The angel may have spoken to others, but here is Marys clear response. And so to that long history of words and of art, trying to express the importance and the beauty of this occasion and its consequences.

Paintings of the annunciation depict, as do the words, the calm dedication of Mary. And this may help us understand God's work with his people, namely in choosing us for particular tasks, allowing us the opportunity to say 'no', but if we accept, giving us the strength to follow the task through. That is what should be called vocation, except that many seem to have reduced the idea of vocation to clergy...and that is mighty stupid, as vocations in fact crop up for all of us all the time: Whom to care for lovingly, whom to challenge, what causes to lend weight to, how to speak of one's Christian faith.

Mary's life must have been complex and hard, as is shown by her mentions in the scriptures: the mother and the growing child. That gives artists an opportunity which they have taken up in their hundreds; hence the ignorant question of the student who asked 'Why is the child in the pictures always a boy?'. The student was calmly told the answer. For Mary, there is then the life as the mother of a child who grows up, who learns, who gathers followers and who is seen increasingly as a threat by the religious and the political authorities who are the ones who eventually set out to kill him. Mary at the foot of the Cross. Then Mary as a prominent part of the development of the Christian faith. Pictures again, but also words of faith through the ages, especially in the Roman Catholic and Orthodox wings of the Church who frequently say: 'Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb Jesus. Holy Mary, mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death'.

Today we can reflect on why all this (which we call the annunciation: essential to the incarnation), happened at the time and in the manner that it did. I am pleased that the Iona Community, often interestingly eccentric,

produced a paper on what it called God's Great 'What If?' God the Father had been through many centuries as we know from the bible's Old Testament: dealing with leaders like Moses, teaching psalms, encouraging prophets, and giving warnings to the people so that they do not stray from the ways of God. Yet the impact was not always great and obedience to God was not always clear. And so the lona Community paper, in its strange manner, imagines God the Father thinking 'What if?rather than being everywhere, what if I limit myself to a bodily form? What is more, what if I do it through a humble family and then live life through thirty fairly ordinary years? Then, rather than choosing clever companions, what if I have a random sample of various odd people around me? What if I heal the sick, preach the word, and teach my companions about the way, the truth, the life? And what if all my attempts to save the world by my life and example have limited effects; then rather than returning to heaven, I accept the capital punishment which earth reserves for those whose integrity and compassion are too much to bear? And what if, when I'm dead, I don't just lie down, but continue my ministry in a Trinitarian form: Father, Son and Holy Spirit?

That is the lona paper with its heading "God's great 'What If": rather shocking and amazing. Yet, when we meditate on it a few times, we might get the point, for we need an explanation of 'Why then?' and 'Why like that?'. Jesus' mother, his life, his death, his resurrection; how does it all fit together?

At the centre of it all is the God the Father and God the Son, joined of course with the Holy Spirit, the go-between and enabler. Yet, as Christians have always realized, there is also Mary. Mary's life is not easy to track. Of course, the baby's birth in Bethlehem with the visits of the wise men and the shepherds. As recorded in Matthew's Gospel, then the escape to Egypt for maybe three years, in order to avoid Herod: a time about which the Coptic church in North Africa is very proud. The presentation of the child Jesus in the temple in Jerusalem when he was blessed by the old man Simeon, who declared Jesus to be the Messiah and foresaw sorrow for Mary. Then Jesus at the age of twelve, discovered by Mary and Joseph in the temple, sitting among the rabbi teachers and discussing with them. Mary rebuked Jesus for not telling his parents where he was going, to which the response was "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?"

Jesus' later ministry seems to have been fairly independent of his mother, although John's Gospel tells of the wedding in Cana of Galilee where, at Mary's prompting, Jesus solved a problem with wine, performing a miracle. He respected his mother's faith as he did all who heard the word of God and kept it (Lk 11;27-28). Mary's last appearance in the Gospels is at the foot of the Cross: Jesus' mother standing near to her son who was dying, crucified as an enemy of the state (Jn 19;25-27) During those last moments, Jesus committed his mother to the Beloved Disciple who took her to his home. That is the last mention of Mary in the bible, except for the time when she and his brothers, together with the apostles participate in a prayer meeting following Jesus' resurrection and ascension (Acts 1;14)

So we give thanks for a remarkable woman and mother, held in awe by the Church down the centuries because of her role central to the incarnation of Jesus. The annunciation and the person of Mary show what a response to God the Father could be and we can but give thanks for her.

Post Communion

Living God, your Son made himself known to his disciples in the breaking of bread: open the eyes of our faith, that we may see him in all his redeeming work; who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.
