### Collect

Almighty God, whose blessed apostles Peter and Paul glorified you in their death as in their life: grant that your Church, inspired by their teaching and example, and made one by your Spirit, may ever stand firm upon the one foundation, Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

## First Reading Acts | 2.1-11

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the lews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.). When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

### Second Reading

### 2 Timothy 4.6-8, 17-18

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing. But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the

message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

## Gospel Reading Matthew 16.13-19

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

## Sermon from Bishop Sandy Millar, on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> June at Aldeburgh

The Book of Common Prayer divides the year into two - the first half is all about doctrine, Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Resurrection, Ascension, Pentecost and Trinity and then starting with the first Sunday after Trinity we crack straight in to the implications of all these for our lives. Today is the 4<sup>th</sup>Sunday after Trinity. How are we getting on? And the issue for us today is the reality of the presence of Jesus in our lives in every situation which of course is the essence of Pentecost.

The GOSPEL (Mark 4:35 to end) tells us of the real crisis that faced the disciples when they ran into a fierce storm, huge waves, howling gale and the almost certainty that they would all drown ...and yet...there was Jesus asleep in the stern apparently totally unaware of the situation that they were in. They woke him up and with a slight note of criticism "Teacher" they said" don't you care that we are perishing?" And the bible tells us that, when he had been wakened, he rebuked the wind and said to the waves "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm." It is interesting to note that the words Jesus addressed to the wind and the waves are exactly the same as he addressed to the demonpossessed man in Mark I. Just as a demon possessed that man so it seems that Jesus recognised the activity of demons in seeking to thwart his intention to cross over to the other side, perhaps not surprising

considering the wonderful miracle that lesus did when he eventually got to the other side in healing the demon possessed man, but there is lesus, totally in control of demons, diseases, disasters and of course the final enemy of mankind...death. Because the power of the bible is not just that lesus took control over the storm although of course he did, and I remember a naval man years ago telling me that at sea even when the wind dies down the waves take much longer, so for it to become completely calm was all part of the miracle? No, the power of the bible is that in similar situations that is what Jesus always does, it is still happening and can happen for us, in the presence of Jesus, we can have peace even in the wildest storms of life. What he looks for in us, as he looked for in them, is faith. He said to his disciples, as he says to us, is "why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" You may know the Alpha definition of faith: ..Finding a promise of God and daring to believe it. In the storm of sorrow, when sorrow comes as come it must, he whispers to us reminding us of the glory of the life to come and he changes the darkness of death into the thought of life eternal, the love of God and the certainty that we shall meet again those whom we have loved and lost awhile; he gives us peace in the storms of life's problems, turning anxiety into a simple trust that he knows what he is doing and the certainty of his love and provision as we commit ourselves again to his care. The secret is his presence, his promise that he will never leave us or forsake us not asleep, and totally in control. Actually I think that that was one of the many wonderful things that Jesus was doing after his resurrection and before he returned to heaven at the Ascension, he kept appearing and disappearing and he made it clear that he had heard their conversation when they thought he wasn't there, but he was getting them used to the idea that he was...he is...here even if we cannot see him. All he looks for in us is the faith to believe it.

Actually our Old Testament lesson (I Samuel 17) speaks of the same confidence that David had in the care, love, and power of the presence of God when he faced huge opposition in the figure of Goliath who committed the fatal error of "defying the armies of the living God" – very unwise - and we see there the effect of David's faith and confidence in God's presence. In the same way in our 2 Corinthians chapter 6 lesson St Paul recounts some of the real hardships he had to endure as a servant of God and therefore assured of God's presence.

As I have been thinking about this morning I realise that we here have a very inspiring and beautiful visual aid to faith in God's presence with us in what we call the Trinity Altar cloth. It was commissioned by my mother in law whom I know some of you knew, in memory of her husband Hugh and made by a lady called Belinda Scarlett who did work in Westminster

Abbey, Winchester Cathedral, Lambeth Palace and various other places (including Aldeburgh Parish Church) and is based on Psalm 139, a beautifully poetic psalm of David, actually in the Gelineau version this psalm is given the heading "The hound of heaven", a reminder that Francis Thomson's lovely poem of that name owed its theme of flight and pursuit largely to the second part of this psalm which is one of the summits of Old Testament poetry. The psalm is David's worshipful recognition of God's all-seeing nature, there is nothing he doesn't see, and to his all embracing presence, there is nowhere that his spirit cannot be and there is no possibility, even if we wanted to, for us to escape his presence...verse 7, 8 7. Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? 8. If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. The altar cloth is a representation of the view from Crag path looking out to sea 9. If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast. I am hoping that every time we come into church and see the altar cloth we can be reminded that wherever I go...even if it is on the far side of the sea, God has promised that his hand will guide us, and his right hand will hold us fast. It is a promise of the God who keeps his promises and never lets us down.

### **Post Communion**

Almighty God, who on the day of Pentecost sent your Holy Spirit to the apostles with the wind from heaven and in tongues of flame, filling them with joy and boldness to preach the gospel: by the power of the same Spirit strengthen us to witness to your truth and to draw everyone to the fire of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord.




Tea, coffee and cakes will be available in the Village Hall. There will be a Bar and BBQ on the Green and food and drink at The Old Chequers.
