A Message from our Rev'd Mary Brown

Dear Friends,

Two weekends ago, a team from across the benefice attended a course called Leading Your Church into Growth. The course helps churches to assess, and plan for, mission and outreach. During the weekend we were asked to estimate how many people (who don't worship with us regularly) come into contact with our congregations each year. We estimated that about 7000 people are in some way in contact with the churches in our benefice across the course of a year. Wow!

Over the last two weeks I have had the privilege of seeing this in action. Last Monday the Aldeburgh Youth Club had a wonderful last session of term, taking the young people for a tour of the Lifeboat Station and then chips on the beach. That Thursday was Classics on the Green in Friston which saw people coming from far and wide for a lovely afternoon out, organised by the church. On Friday we had the Knodishall quiz, which

draws those from the church, the village, the benefice, and beyond, to spend a fun evening together. In Aldringham on Sunday we had Choral Evensong where many come to hear the beautiful music and enjoy a different style of worship.

In our PCC meetings we have been reading Matthew 28:16-20 where Jesus tells the 11 disciples to 'go therefore and make disciples of all nations'. As I reflected on what we had learnt on the course, and went about my week in the benefice, I was struck by the tireless efforts of those from across all four of our churches to reach out to our wider communities with the good news of Jesus Christ. I'm excited to see where we'll go as we build on this already strong foundation.

Collect

Almighty Lord and everlasting God, we beseech you to direct, sanctify and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of your laws and the works of your commandments; that through your most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading 2 Samuel 7.1-14a

Now when the king was settled in his house, and the Lord had given him rest from all his enemies around him, the king said to the prophet Nathan, 'See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent.' Nathan said to the king, 'Go, do all that you have in mind; for the Lord is with you.' But that same night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the Lord: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, 'Why have you not built me a house of cedar?' Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the Lord of

hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover, the Lord declares to you that the Lord will make you a house. When your days are fulfilled and you lie down with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring after you, who shall come forth from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build a house for my name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom for ever. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me. When he commits iniquity, I will punish him with a rod such as mortals use, with blows inflicted by human beings.

Second Reading Ephesians 2.11-end

So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision'-a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands-remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, so that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling-place for God.

Gospel Reading

Mark 6.30-34, 53-end

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things. When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the market-places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

Sermon from Rev'd Nichola Winter, on Sunday 7th July at Friston

2 Samuel 5:1-5;9-10

2 Cor 12:2-10

Mark 6:1-13

At a service of morning prayer recently, the person leading prayers got to the part where we pray for the world and its needs. With a sigh he said, 'And now we pray for the world, which is in a mess.' And yes, it might be tempting to agree and to become very disheartened. Peace in the world seems fragile and uneasy; the political landscape in Britain has changed dramatically; here, in Friston, we continue to face uncertainty as to how our local surroundings will be affected by the change in regime. Now, more than ever, we need to uphold the situations of concern in prayer. It would be easy to become despondent, to wring our hands and believe we can do nothing about it.

But, if you take nothing away from the service today, you may care to reflect on three thoughts from the bible readings and a phrase from the post-communion collect.

We hear in the reading from Samuel how David becomes 'greater and greater because the Lord is with him.' Paul describes how he receives the message, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." And then, Jesus tells his disciples - 'take nothing for the journey....' And in the prayer after communion later in the service we

acknowledge that God leads us to the living water and we pray that He will refresh and sustain us.

What do these seemingly random phrases say to us? Faith is the key. Where we can, we need to act. Where we can't act, we do need to pray. We need to uphold to God these situations that prevent the world finding a sustainable balance and ask that his healing, his love, his gentle rule of justice and peace, might prevail. Above all, we need to ask for forgiveness for the ways in which we can so easily ignore or misuse the gifts we are given and the opportunities that come our way to speak of our faith and our desire to serve and worship a God who cares deeply for our world and all its children. It's unlikely that any one of us will have all the answers to all the world's problems - but as Christians we are called to play our part, to listen to what God is saying to each one of us and to act on it in a way consistent with the circumstances in which we find ourselves.

Paul is very aware of this concept - how we use the resources given to us for speaking of, and living out, the gospel. He speaks rather enigmatically in this passage - but it is clear that he affirms that no matter what our own personal difficulties are we press on for the sake of Christ. And the Lord uses our weakness and works through it -

"My grace is sufficient for you' he says, 'for power is made perfect in weakness."

We might think that Jesus would have faced none of these problems. After all, he is is the Son of God. Ultimately he will overcome death itself. But it's not all plain sailing. By the time we get to this bit of Mark's account of the life of Jesus, Jesus has already astonished the folk in the synagogue by teaching with authority; he's gained a name for casting out evil spirits, curing the sick and even calming down extreme weather conditions. But when he comes back to his hometown, where he has been known as a child and as the son of the local carpenter, nobody can believe that this familiar individual can really be so wise; can really make all these amazing things happen. Jesus is seen as a very ordinary person indeed. As a prophet he's getting rather an unsympathetic reception.

But at this point, Jesus does something extraordinary. He sends his team of friends and helpers out on a mission - but he doesn't ensure that they are well equipped for their travels. Don't take extra clothing, he says, don't take spare food, don't bother with money - go in faith that you will find what you need on your travels. It takes great faith to trust completely to that extent - and yet, it is often the case, that when we have tried

relying on our own resources and failed, it is when we have nothing - that God comes to the rescue and helps us achieve what we believed to be impossible. We are encouraged never to give up on prayer; never to cease upholding to God all those ghastly situations in the world and in our own environment about which we feel we can do so little. If we allow ourselves to become depressed and despondent, then evil wins - and we simply mustn't allow that to happen. God calls us to be prophets, to speak of his love, his wisdom and to live out our lives in the light of his healing gospel. In humility we need to allow him to equip us, to lead us; and we can only do that through listening, through prayer and through recognising our encounters with him in the world.

O Lord of light and vision, open our eyes to behold your presence, to perceive your love and to see your purpose for us; that rejoicing in your presence and strengthened by your love we may do your will and become what you have called us to be; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Post Communion

Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that have taken holy things; may the ears which have heard your word be deaf to clamour and dispute; may the tongues which have sung your praise be free from deceit; may the eyes which have seen the tokens of your love shine with the light of hope; and may the bodies which have been fed with your body be refreshed with the fullness of your life; glory to you for ever.




