Collect

Eternal Father, who at the baptism of Jesus revealed him to be your Son, anointing him with the Holy Spirit: grant to us, who are born again by water and the Spirit, that we may be faithful to our calling as your adopted children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading

Isaiah 43.1-7

But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba in exchange for you. Because you are precious in my sight, and honoured, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. Do not fear, for I am with you; I will bring your offspring from the east, and from the west I will gather you; I will say to the north, 'Give them up', and to the south, 'Do not withhold; bring my sons from far away and my daughters from the end of the earth-everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made.'

Second Reading Acts 8.14-17

Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). Then Peter and John laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Gospel Reading Luke 3.15-17, 21-22

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowingfork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.' Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

Sermon by Revd Mary Brown at Aldringham & Knodishall, 5th January

'They were overwhelmed with joy'. I wonder how much joy we each felt this Christmas? I imagine that for most of us Christmas was a mixed bag joy and sadness bundled together, as much of our human experience is. But today we meet wise men, who came from distant lands, found Jesus, and were OVERWHELMED WITH JOY.

Today is the last day of the Christmas season, the twelfth day of Christmas, and tomorrow the season of Epiphany begins with the feast of Epiphany. In our churches we are marking epiphany today, making sure this important moment is not overlooked.

So before we dive into our readings let's take a moment to consider the season of Epiphany as a whole, and what there is in store for us between now and Candlemas on 2nd February.

The word epiphany means to suddenly see reality clearly. In every day conversation the statement 'I've had an epiphany' means that we have suddenly understood something we hadn't understood before. The Christian meaning of Epiphany is very similar - it's about humanity suddenly being shown the reality of Jesus Christ as the long awaited saviour sent from God. Humanity suddenly realising that in Jesus, God had come down to dwell among his people and be the light dispelling their darkness.

In the season of Epiphany we get a whistle stop tour of Jesus' life and some key moments that show us the reality of who he is.

- It begins today with the wise men arriving in Bethlehem and worshipping Jesus, more on that in a moment.
- Next week we see Jesus' baptism, and his identity as the Son of God

 we'll hear the voice from heaven declaring over him 'this is my son,
 with him I am well pleased' as well as the Holy Spirit coming to rest on him revealing Jesus as God.
- After that we'll go with Jesus, his mother, and his disciples, to Cana to the wedding where he performed his first public miracle, turning

the waters of ritual and restriction in the wine of his abundant generosity.

- Then we'll see Jesus in a synagogue in Galilee reading from the prophet Isaiah, telling the people there that he is the one who has come to set prisoners free, heal the sick, feed the hungry.
- Finally we go with Jesus, Mary and Joseph to the temple where Simeon and Anna prophecy over Jesus announcing him as the one who will die in order to defeat death and then reign as king forever.

Let's dive into today's readings. In Isaiah we see the promise of a coming light - the glory of the Lord arising and dispelling the darkness. The glory of the Lord shining as a beacon, that will draw in all the people's of the earth.

And then in our gospel reading we saw these wise men, coming from afar, from distant nations, following a light, and being led to Bethlehem, to an ordinary home, in an ordinary village, where they found an extraordinary child who reshaped their entire understanding of reality. The fulfilment of this prophecy from Isaiah - as the people of the earth gather around the light of God's glory.

But first, before the wise men got to Bethlehem they met someone else - another King - Herod. Herod also saw reality in a new way that day, but his reaction to this new reality could not have been more different. Where the wise men reacted in reverence - worshipping and paying homage. Herod reacted in fear.

When the wise men arrived at Herod's temple, they told him that they were looking for the child who was to be born King of the Jews - the Messiah, or saviour who had been prophesied throughout the scriptures.

Herod knew that it was not him they were seeking. Herod was a king by permission of the Roman Empire - he knew that he was not God's appointed king, in the Royal line of David. This epiphany, that the legitimate king had arrived shook him to the core. Here were wise, and wealthy visitors from a distant land, in his palace - carrying gifts - and not offering them to him. Here were men who he thought should have paid him homage, and they didn't, instead they asked him where the true king was.

Through the arrival of the wise men, Herod was given an opportunity - to lay down his own glory, for the better reality of Christ's glory. But instead he chose to try and protect his own power.

The wise men's reaction was radically different. They did not bow down to Herod's version of reality, but stuck to the truth - Herod was not who they were seeking. Herod's show of wealth and power, his palace and his riches, did not sway them. They did not stop to pay Herod homage but carried on on their journey seeking the Christ child.

And when they got to Bethlehem they were rewarded with overwhelming joy. They knelt down and worshipped, in an ordinary room, no royal courtiers, no nursery staff, no cooks or offers of food after their long journey. Here they paid the Christ child homage - Homage is not a phrase that we use very often these days but it refers to the act of submitting to a ruler, of presenting yourself and your 'gifts'.

The wise men submitted themselves and their riches to Jesus, laying at his feet all that they were and the gifts that they had prepared.

Let's pause for a moment to think about what these prophetic gifts tell us about who Jesus is:

- Gold is what you give to a King these wise men, in all their wealth and power and social standing, knew that Jesus was the king of kings.
- Frankincense signifies a Priest like we read last year in the Book of Hebrews - these wise men knew that Jesus would become our Great High Priest.
- Myrrh is used to prepare a body for burial. These wise men had read the scriptures - they knew that God's chosen one would be the suffering servant.

So if we think it is strange that these powerful men fell down on their knees to worship a baby - let's think about who that baby is - the one who came to reign over all the earth, the one who came to make a way for us to be in relationship with God, the one who would die and rise again, defeating death, sin, and all the brokenness of the world.

Our readings today present us with two options of how we will respond to the Epiphany - the new understanding of reality that Jesus ushered in.

We could react like Herod - react out of fear, making our own plans for self-preservation and the defence of our power, riches and status - seeking our own glory.

Or we could react like the wise men - in surrender and adoration - laying down at Jesus' feet all that we are. Knowing that when we do that we will find that Jesus reaches out his hand to us, invites us to stand, and declares over us, as we heard in Isaiah 'arise, shine, for your light has come.'

So today, what will we choose? Self-aggrandisement, seeking after our own power, status, wealth and reputation and rejecting the boundless riches of Christ?

Or self-surrender at Jesus' feet, so that he might rise us up bold, confident, and glorious in him.

Let's take a moment to reflect on what we have heard, to ask the Holy Spirit to bring to mind those things we have yet to surrender to God, and to ask him to turn our hearts, our minds and our desires away from the things of the world towards Christ in all his glory.

Post Communion

Lord of all time and eternity, you opened the heavens and revealed yourself as Father in the baptism of Jesus your beloved Son: by the power of your Spirit complete the heavenly work of our rebirth through the waters of the new creation; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Wednesday – Aldeburgh




