#### **Collect**

O God the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: we beseech you, leave us not comfortless, but send your Holy Spirit to strengthen us and exalt us to the place where our Saviour Christ is gone before, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God. now and for ever.

### First Reading Ezekiel 36.24-28

I will take you from the nations, and gather you from all the countries, and bring you into your own land. I will sprinkle clean water upon you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will put my spirit within you, and make you follow my statutes and be careful to observe my ordinances. Then you shall live in the land that I gave to your ancestors; and you shall be my people, and I will be your God.

# Second Reading Acts 16.16-34

One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave-girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, 'These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation.' She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, 'I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her.' And it came out that very hour. But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the market-place before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, 'These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe.' The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing

and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks. About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, 'Do not harm yourself, for we are all here.' The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, 'Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' They answered, 'Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household.' They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.

# Gospel Reading John 17.20-end

'I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world. 'Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them.'

### Sermon by Revd Nichola Winter at Friston & Aldeburgh, 25th May

In a few weeks time the church will move into what is called 'ordinary time'. The seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Ascensiontide, Pentecost and Trinity will have rolled around the cycle of the church's year; the church hangings and priest's vestments will move to the colour green, symbolizing nature and growth. The lectionary readings will focus on the teachings of Jesus. The cycle - the circle - takes us round again - but each time we find ourselves in a different place to where we were before.

The ancient Greeks considered the circle to be the perfect shape – eternal; without beginning or end – a perfectly balanced whole. A single circle is a symbol of the divine – of eternity – and so it also came to represent God. If we look at many pictures of saints – what do we see that is circular? The halo – often depicted as circular, a reminder of holiness and the saint's being at one with God.

The green-fingered amongst us will be busily occupied in gardens and allotments, dealing with the flourishing spring growth. As we plant seed in the ground at this time we are reminded of the growing cycle – the seed planted sprouts and grows; it produces flowers, fruit and seed. The seed falls to the earth where it lies sleeping for a while and then it sprouts again – we say that we have come full circle and the cycle starts all over again. God's growing circle is good...

There's another reason why we might think about circles today. Today is Rogation Sunday – the Sunday before Ascension Day. Rogation days continue with the three days before Ascension Day. The name comes form the Latin word, rogare, meaning 'to ask.' Our prayers will often take the form of a circle of prayer - for the church, for our community, for individuals.

It used to be common practice for the people of a parish to process all the way round and finish where they had started — marking out the boundaries and praying for each part of the parish. Some years ago the churches in our benefice joined together for a prayer walk - a kind of 'beating of the bounds' and that took in all the churches in the benefice. It was a good way of establishing the boundaries of our benefice in our minds - reminding us of those communities for whom we pray day by day and week by week in our cycle of prayer.

...and praying out of doors is not an unusual activity. Referring again to the early apostles, we're told that 'On the sabbath day they went outside the gate by the river, where they supposed there was a place of prayer; and they sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there.' That encounter led to the baptism of Lydia and her household. Baptism leads to a journey of faith for each of us - and that faith tells us that we shall, in due course, encounter the heavenly vision as set out by John.

So circles and cycles are important. In our 24/7 culture today it an be difficult to get the circular rhythm of work-rest-play right in our lives - but that Sabbath rest is so important, whether it be putting our feet up with a nice cup of tea, getting into the garden, or going out for a walk. Jesus calls us to find the peace that he offers through hearing his words — but knowing also that the peace he offers does not always come in the way that the world gives peace.

'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives.'

Jesus looks ahead. He lives, dies and is buried, but rises again and calls us to lasting life. As the circle of the year goes on, we approach Ascension Day and Pentecost – the time when God sends the Holy Spirit to be with us, as promised by Jesus himself - 'the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you.'

Celtic prayer features circles, too, and I want to finish with a Celtic prayer. It reminds us that God is there to help us at all times throughout the day and throughout our lives – he encircles us with his love and protection, especially when he sends us out to proclaim, pray and evangelise.

Circle me, O God, Keep Calm within, keep Turmoil out.

Circle me, O God, Keep Faith within, keep Doubt without.

Circle me, O God, Keep Life within, keep Death without.

Keep me, O Lord, as the apple of your eye; hide me under the shadow of your wings. Here I am, Lord, send me.

#### **Post Communion**

Eternal God, giver of love and power, your Son Jesus Christ has sent us into all the world to preach the gospel of his kingdom: confirm us in this mission, and help us to live the good news we proclaim; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
