As we move into the Autumn together, let's encourage one another in our worship, rejoicing together as we are all built into the holy church through the goodness of lesus and by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, you are always more ready to hear than we to pray and to give more than either we desire or deserve: pour down upon us the abundance of your mercy, forgiving us those things of which our conscience is afraid and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to ask but through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Jeremiah 18.1-11

The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: 'Come, go down to the potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words.' So I went down to the potter's house, and there he was working at his wheel. The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him. Then the word of the Lord came to me: Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done? says the Lord. Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel. At one moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom, that I will pluck up and break down and destroy it, but if that nation, concerning which I have spoken, turns from its evil, I will change my mind about the disaster that I intended to bring on it. And at another moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom that I will build and plant it, but if it does evil in my sight, not listening to my voice, then I will change my mind about the good that I had intended to do to it. Now, therefore, say to the people of Judah and the inhabitants of lerusalem: Thus says the Lord: Look, I am a potter shaping evil against you and devising a plan against you. Turn now, all of you from your evil way, and amend your ways and your doings.

Second Reading Philemon 1-21

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow-soldier, and to the church in your house: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith towards the Lord lesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not

something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for ever, no longer as a slave but as more than a slave, a beloved brother-especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

Gospel Reading Luke 14.25-33

Now large crowds were travelling with him; and he turned and said to them, 'Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish." Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.

As last week's benefice service had a talk by the Kagera link team, Revd Nichola Winter has kindly shared her sermon from the 24th August – Tenth Sunday after Trinity

Sometimes we find ourselves in sticky situations. Many years ago, as a student, I was living in an exceedingly dodgy part of Manchester. In those days, Christian Aid envelopes got delivered to all households, and then had to be collected. I had agreed to be part of the collecting team but I have to say that, as I embarked on this task, I was feeling very anxious about the reception I might receive. Let's just say that it wasn't the most godly part of the city and I never felt safe if I had to be out late at night. However, this passage from Jeremiah came to mind as I set about knocking on doors.

"Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." - or in my case, a girl... And the Lord answers:

"Do not say, 'I am only a boy,' for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you."

And I was astonished at the unexpected and warm welcome I received. Most folk were happy to return the envelopes - some even contained donations(!) - and there were also some interesting conversations to be had. My apprehension and fears had been, mostly, groundless. God goes with us more often than we care to acknowledge.

He knows, too, that we need time out - a proper sabbath on which to re-charge our batteries. Some of us may recall the 'Keep Sunday Special' campaign from several years ago. In our 24/7 society, where life doesn't stand still, media, technology and communication continues around the clock; we've become used to universal availability. We're able to shop via the internet, access financial institutions at the touch of a button, purchase a loaf of bread or pint of milk at almost any time of day or night. The once particular, unique, feel of a Sunday, when most commercial, business and sporting activity ceased for 24hours has disappeared. We no longer recognise the idea of a universal day of rest.

I confess to somewhat ambivalent feelings about this. My early working life was spent in the hotel industry; 24/7 then was a way of life long before it became the common term it is today. I would have welcomed a Sunday off. And many others will have experienced it too: those in the forces, doctors & hospital workers; the clergy; emergency and essential services; the list goes on... Our radio weather forecasters often use what seems a rather peculiar phrase when they talk about the

'beginning of the working week' - I sometimes wonder just what world they live in...

But the point is this: whether we work regular hours and regular days, or whether our work time is dictated by a 24hour/7day shift timetable, we all need to observe some kind of Sabbath day. The gospel reading sharpens this focus. There is a difference between 'working' and - in Jesus' case - 'being set free from bondage on the sabbath day.'

Sabbath, of course, comes from the Hebrew word shabbat meaning 'to cease.' It has its roots in the biblical story of creation, when, we are told, God ceased to be busy. He ceased activity and rested from his labours. The idea of 'ceasing' passed into law; humankind was to observe a time of rest when the wonders of creation could be observed; when God could be worshipped and thanks given to the Creator of all. This has continued through the ages; we all need a time of rest and re-creation; a period when we can cease from daily activity, take time out to appreciate and reflect on what God is doing in our lives.

Jesus, of course, was adept at making his point in fairly sharp and sometimes uncomfortable ways. He would often come up against the authorities, demonstrating that whilst they were admirable in their observance of the law, the rules and the regulations, the absence of true love and compassion - their neglect of the poor and needy - meant that their religious observance on its own simply didn't ring true. Luke tells us here of the woman who comes to the synagogue on the sabbath. Note that it is a woman in this story - God's kingdom is not just for the menfolk. It's not just for the healthy and upright either - it is for all. We don't know why the woman came - had she heard about Jesus and wondered if it might just be possible to see him, to be seen by him, or even (tremble at the thought) to speak to him? Or was she attending as was her custom; the Sabbath was her delight, she loved God and had come to worship? We don't know.

But we do know that Jesus saw her; was aware of her and recognised her predicament. And what he does then is truly a celebration of the Sabbath in its deepest meaning - a release from the effects of the fallen order. A release of the woman from her physical disability; a 'ceasing' of her discomfort and probable estrangement because she was not whole and perfectly formed. The Sabbath's purpose, as Jesus sees it, is fulfilled not by forbidding works of compassion but by encouraging and enabling them.

God promises to teach us how to speak, as he teaches Jeremiah. The writer of the letter to the Hebrews gives us that delightful vision - 'You have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven... to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.' Jesus' action on the Sabbath brings new life to the woman in the story. And surely new life is what the Sabbath is for? That new life, that sets each one of us free - free to live, free to worship.

We will each find that revealed in different ways. So, however you worship; however you serve - may your sabbath, (on whatever day we make it) - your ceasing from the everyday cares of the world - be blessed.
