A message from Revd Mary Brown

Dear Friends,

One of the joys of this summer has been the number of children I have been able to baptise. One of my favourite moments in the baptism liturgy is when the candidate is signed with the sign of the cross with the words 'Christ claims you as his own'. I love that idea of Christ claiming us as his own and the assurance that comes from that.

The waters of baptism represent our dying to our old lives and being reborn into new life in Christ. Paul puts it this way when he writes to the Colossians: 'For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God.' (Colossians 3:3). What does it mean for our lives to be hidden with Christ in God? One modern author puts it this way: 'I am one in whom Christ

dwells and delights, I live in the strong and unshakable kingdom of God, the kingdom is not in trouble and neither am I.' (James Bryan Smith) When our lives are hidden with Christ in God we are welcomed into God's good kingdom, we are safe in that kingdom, and in God's delight in us.

If you have been baptised you have had these words spoken over you 'Christ claims you as his own' - rejoice in your hiddenness in Christ, your safety in his Kingdom.

If reading this makes you want to be baptised, reach out, have a conversation with one of us, we would love to baptise you!

Collect

Almighty God, who called your Church to bear witness that you were in Christ reconciling the world to yourself: help us to proclaim the good news of your love, that all who hear it may be drawn to you; through him who was lifted up on the cross, and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Jeremiah 4.11-12, 22-28

At that time it will be said to this people and to Jerusalem: A hot wind comes from me out of the bare heights in the desert towards my poor people, not to winnow or cleanse-a wind too strong for that. Now it is I who speak in judgement against them. 'For my people are foolish, they do not know me; they are stupid children, they have no understanding. They are skilled in doing evil, but do not know how to do good.' I looked on the earth, and lo, it was waste and void; and to the heavens, and they had no light. I looked on the mountains, and lo, they were quaking, and all the hills moved to and fro. I looked, and lo, there was no one at all, and all the birds of the air had fled. I looked, and lo, the fruitful land was a desert, and all its cities were laid in ruins before the Lord, before his fierce anger. For thus says the Lord: The whole land shall be a desolation; yet I will not make a full end. Because of this the earth shall mourn, and the heavens above grow black; for I have spoken, I have purposed; I have not relented nor will I turn back.

Second Reading I Timothy 1.12-17

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners-of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Reading Luke 15.1-10

Now all the tax-collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, 'This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he told them this parable: 'Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost." lust so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who need no repentance. 'Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, "Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost." Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.'

Sermon on Luke 14:25-33

The Cost and Joy of Discipleship

There is a striking realism in Jesus' words in today's Gospel. It might not be what we expect from a spiritual leader addressing a crowd of enthusiastic followers.

Imagine the scene: Jesus is becoming well known. "Large crowds were travelling with him." In today's terms, he's gaining followers, gaining attention, trending. And yet, instead of capitalising on that moment and making his message more palatable, he turns to them and says:

"Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters—yes, even life itself—cannot be my disciple."

What are we to do with this?

Jesus' words are hard. Not because they are complicated, but because they are painfully clear. He is confronting us with the **cost of discipleship**—not in vague terms, but with uncomfortable, relational, even emotional language.

But here's the thing: Jesus never tricks anyone into following Him. He is not selling a cheap grace or a watered-down version of the Gospel. He speaks with love, but also with clarity. Because He knows that a shallow faith won't last through life's storms. And He knows that true discipleship cannot be half-hearted.

Let's clear one thing up: when Jesus says we must "hate" our families, He is not contradicting the commandment to honour our father and mother. Nor is He telling us to despise those we love. This is strong, Semitic hyperbole—an ancient teaching style meant to **shock the listener into attention.**

In Hebrew thought, to "hate" something could mean to love it less than something else. Jesus is saying that loyalty to Him must come before even our closest human relationships. That compared to our love for Him, every other allegiance must be secondary.

This isn't about cruelty. It's about priority.

We are not called to be bad parents or spouses or friends. Quite the opposite. But we are called to allow Jesus to shape how we love those people—how we forgive them, serve them, and stay faithful to them. If Jesus is at the centre, every other relationship will begin to flourish under His Lordship.

Then Jesus raises the stakes again:

"Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple."

To Jesus' original listeners, this wasn't a metaphor. They lived under Roman occupation. Crucifixion was a real and brutal punishment—used to shame and silence anyone who opposed the powers that be. So when Jesus talks about "carrying the cross," He is talking about a **willingness to suffer**, to endure shame, to face opposition for the sake of the Gospel.

Discipleship is not a path of comfort. It's a path of transformation. Sometimes it means saying no to things that everyone else is saying yes to. Sometimes it means choosing integrity over popularity. Sometimes it means forgiving when it's easier to walk away. The cross is not just a symbol we wear; it is a *life we live*.

Jesus gives us two small parables to drive home the point:

- I. A man planning to build a tower.
- 2. A king preparing for war.

Both begin with careful consideration. Both involve asking: Can I afford to do this? What will it require of me? Am I willing to see it through?

Jesus is inviting us not just to believe in Him, but to follow Him—with eyes wide open. He wants no illusions. No shallow enthusiasm. He wants our hearts—but He also wants our commitment.

Christianity is not a hobby. It's not something we fit in on Sundays. It is a call on our whole life—our time, our decisions, our money, our relationships, our work.

We don't follow Jesus part-time. He calls us to follow Him with everything.

The final line in this passage is perhaps the hardest:

"None of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions."

Again, this isn't about literal poverty for all believers. But it is about detachment. Jesus is pointing to the things we cling to—the things we think will give us security or status or self-worth.

What do we possess that possesses us?

- Is it wealth or control?
- Is it a reputation we're afraid to lose?
- Is it bitterness we won't release?
- Is it comfort we refuse to exchange for calling?

To be a disciple is to live open-handedly—to say to Jesus: All I have is yours. Use it, Lord, as you will.

Now, all of this might feel overwhelming. And if we're honest, none of us measures up fully to this standard. We've all fallen short of this radical call.

But here's the good news: Jesus knows this.

The same Jesus who calls us to count the cost is the One who went to the cross for us. He is not asking us to do anything He hasn't done Himself. He gave up everything—his comfort, his reputation, even his life—so that we might live in Him.

And He does not ask us to follow Him alone. He gives us His Spirit. He surrounds us with His Church. He strengthens us in the Eucharist. He walks with us, step by step, as we become more like Him.

Let me leave you with this: Discipleship is costly, yes. But it is also **glorious.**

In giving up our lives, we find true life.

In letting go of control, we find freedom.

In following Jesus, we discover joy, purpose, and a love that will never let us go.

The Christian life is not easy. But it is good. It is beautiful. And it is worth everything.

So today, Jesus turns to us—not just the crowds, but us—and says:

"Count the cost. Come and follow me."

Let us respond with open hearts, with renewed trust, and with the courage to place Jesus at the centre of all we are.

Because what we give up for Christ is nothing compared to what we gain in Him.

Amen.

Bells at Aldeburgh Parish Church

Some essential maintenance work is to be carried out on the bell fittings next Monday, I5th September. This will involve removing the pulleys that the bell ropes run over, taking them to John Taylor's Bell Foundry in Loughborough for refurbishment and then reinstalling them.

Pulleys, on average, have a life expectancy of fifty years and the Aldeburgh ones have been in situ for sixty five years and over time have become quite grooved from rope wear and a couple are not as perfectly round as they should be which is starting to make ringing slightly more difficult, so the ringers will be very pleased to have this work completed.

This will mean that the bells will be out of action for two or three weeks, until the pulleys are returned.
