DON'T FORGET TO PUT THE CLOCKS BACK

Autumn has really arrived, I've been collecting chestnuts in the Rectory garden, my lawn is covered in crunchy orange leaves, and I'm starting to plan which fireworks displays I will go to! A friend recently sent me an essay written by Quaker theologian Parker J. Palmer about the Christian life and the seasons. You can find it

In the essay Palmer talks about how in Autumn we are inclined to look at the surface and see things ending and being stripped back, but that we often forget what is going on below the surface. Those of us who are gardeners and veg growers know that in the Autumn things are already being prepared for the spring, whether through planting spring bulbs, or through the seeds of things like spinach, lettuce, dill and fennel, that have fallen to the ground and will sprout without us having to do anything to them when the spring comes around. Palmer writes about our human inclination to escape the darkness into artificial light, and escape decay and decline, but how even in our spiritual lives these rhythms are necessary. Things need to be stripped back and to die away in order to make room for new life.

'Autumn constantly reminds me that my daily dyings are necessary precursors to new life. If I try to "make" a life that defies the diminishments of autumn, the life I end up with will be artificial, at best, and utterly colorless as well. But when I yield to the endless interplay of living and dying, dying and living, the life I am given will be real and colorful, fruitful and whole.'

This Autumn may we be open to the work of the Holy Spirit, stripping things back, clearing old growth, mulching our souls, ready for the abundance of Spring.

Collect

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: help us so to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that, through patience, and the comfort of your holy word, we may embrace and for ever hold fast the hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 45.22-end

Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other. By myself I have sworn, from my mouth has gone forth in righteousness a word that shall not return: 'To me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear.' Only in the Lord, it shall be said of me, are righteousness and strength; all who were incensed against him shall come to him and be ashamed. In the Lord all the offspring of Israel shall triumph and glory.

Second Reading Romans 15.1-6

We who are strong ought to put up with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. Each of us must please our neighbour for the good purpose of building up the neighbour. For Christ did not please himself; but, as it is written, 'The insults of those who insult you have fallen on me.' For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Reading Luke 4.16-24

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.' All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, 'Is not this Joseph's son?' He said to them, 'Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, "Doctor, cure yourself!" And you will say, "Do here also in your home town the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum." 'And he said, 'Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's home town.

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis, 19th October – Eighteenth Sunday after Trinity

Today's Gospel has its parable from Jesus. He tells the story about this judge who doesn't properly respond to the one who keeps on bothering him... except that he eventually gives in, to get her out of the way. Then Jesus is saying that God the Father is not like that, for God grants justice to those who respond to him. Jesus is speaking about God's love – his kindness – that's a better word – God's kindness to those with faith in God the Father. God is the righteous judge who listens patiently to the faithful. God is kind, but then a somewhat mournful verse which poses a question: And yet, will the Son of God find faith on earth?

Kindness. I think for once it may be good for us to have a look at this question and wonder how we are getting on – what the Church and its faith are like. Possibly best discussed over coffee in the hall, rather than listening to a sermon. I must warn you that I will be delving into my own experience. Also, I am going to praise women and rejoice at the new female Archbishop of Canterbury.

Here we go...my own ministry. Life began with year studying theology in the USA, having just get engaged to a young British Roman Catholic woman – fifty something years ago. In the USA, I was asked whether I was prepared to use a couple of summer months running services and teaching in a small riverside village in Alaska. Very odd, but we (self and fiancée) thought that might get married first and then do this together....so we asked the Alaska bishop to marry us, postponing our London reception/party. It was wonderful and we have loved Alaska and that little village ever since.

What made the church tick there? A wonderful gathering of people, friendly...and pleased to see us, as we joined in preparing salmon for eating (women) and some firefighting (very common in Alaskan summer - men)... all that and chatting with children and running church services. Yet it was with my wife that the children chatted to, and it was her who was taken up the mountain to pray at the graves on their ancestors. Wonderful ministry of a woman. And amazing how she got to know all the women as she helped to prepare the salmon.

Next experience: after being a curate, I taught in a British theology-training college: all male, of course, in those days. For those bright young students, it meant 3 years hard labour and many of them went on to all kinds of fascinating jobs — our previous bishop here was one of them: Martin Seeley.

The early 90's...and then in 1994 things changed as it was decided that women should be ordained in the Church of England – on the whole a popular decision. I happened to be Dean of St Albans cathedral at the time and had to prepare for the strange event of 62 women all being ordained on one day, training having been going on for some time. Women then in lots of church jobs.

A little later than that, I had the opportunity to have a couple of months to work with the church in the south-east of Tanzania. I lodged at a nunnery which had some support from St Albans, and I was also invited to preach at churches and then did some teaching at the theological college at Rondo. It was there that I was asked why on earth the Church of England was ordaining women. I said that there had been discussion and decision.... and asked Why Not? I then said that I'd heard of their female nurses becoming very popular in all the villages. Ah, they said, that is because new bikes had enabled the nurses to travel easily, bringing health. I asked about the wonderful nuns. No comment. Nothing much had sunk in and nor had the big part played by women in the church in general.

So...the trainee clergy were against. However, it was true that women played a big part in the church's life; strange example being that when I had preached in a large church, the congregation had a very big female contingent. Indeed, it was not just sitting there, but also participating, for I had only to quote from Jesus or comment on his teaching, for there to be loud enthusiastic response of ululation/hooting (we don't do THAT in England!). They were definitely there and participating. No surprise that things have now changed and women not only make up many of the church's members, but some are ordained.

And here we are with a woman Archbishop of Canterbury (Sarah Mullally) who is, on the whole, being welcomed. You will know that she has done other jobs very well and was a chief nurse and known for her kindness, before ordination. And now women are all over the place. I mentioned that I had been Dean of St Albans – a wonderful experience – and guess what! ...my successor there is a woman. I later went on to be Dean of Oxford, looking after a cathedral and a college all rolled into one....and my successor there is a woman. Things are changing.

I guess that in these roles as in many others, the two sexes of female and male with a mix of skills and character are usefully distributed. Of course, it can be pointed out that the first preachers for Jesus were men in a men's world, but there were also women who showed the kindness, the love which Jesus brought.

Roman Catholicism has kept away from women priests and from married ones, yet they do reflect a lot on their church structures and things may change. In this Anglican parish, there have been men and there are a few ancient masculine characters who help out, but the two regulars at the moment are women and there is now a woman bishop of Bury St Edmunds and then, of course, an Archbishop.

One could talk about all this until the cows come home, but actually the task is to get on with Christian lives, individually and collectively – to worship, pray and learn, acting kindly and lovingly through Jesus Christ our Lord. That is a task for all. Amen.


