Collect

Heavenly Father, whose blessed Son was revealed to destroy the works of the devil and to make us the children of God and heirs of eternal life: grant that we, having this hope, may purify ourselves even as he is pure; that when he shall appear in power and great glory we may be made like him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where he is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Malachi 4.1-2a

See, the day is coming, burning like an oven, when all the arrogant and all evildoers will be stubble; the day that comes shall burn them up, says the Lord of hosts, so that it will leave them neither root nor branch. But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings. You shall go out leaping like calves from the stall.

Second Reading

2 Thessalonians 3.6-13

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading

Luke 21.5-19

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.' They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them. When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. 'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.

Sermon by Revd Nichola Winter 9th November – Remembrance Sunday

The gospel passage today (our second reading on this Remembrance Day) makes for challenging reading. Little comfort for those who have lost a much loved spouse or partner, as a result of war, illness or in the normal course of events. How are we to take it, to pick out the love, comfort and hope we yearn to discern from the words of our Saviour? The Sadducees do not believe in the resurrection, but they are cunning. Their question is designed to trick Jesus - this simple teacher, preacher and healer who has such a simple beginning. Who does he think he is, outwitting those of so much greater learning and standing in the community? But Jesus, in his answer, distinguishes between the current age and the age to come. We're often told that the Kingdom of God is in the here and now - but I sometimes find that hard to believe. With all that is going on in this country, in the world - one has to hope that this isn't all there is. We have to have hope that there is a greater place for us. It is a mystery - one of those things that, it is not given to us in the here and now fully to comprehend it. In his letter to the Thessalonians, Paul writes

'So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.'

And, perhaps this provides some clue as to why we continue with the dignified, moving traditions of Remembrance. We must remember - we must never forget and we must always hold on to the hope that God has better plans for us. In today's confused and confusing world there can be the suspicion that, in the seemingly desperate drive for diversity and inclusivity the basic meaning of Remembrance gets lost. We bring to mind those who fought for their country; those who gave up their lives; those who returned with damaged bodies and minds; those who didn't return at all. Is there a danger that this remembering will just become lost as a stuffy tradition in the minds of those growing up today?

I was reassured when, turning to some light reading, I came across a novel published recently by the Irish author, Evie Woods. Her story tells how, in the course of making a new life in France, the central character visits the Glade of the Armistice, near Compiegne. She writes movingly of how this visit opens up to her just how much had been lost and destroyed by two world wars. Standing at the spot where an internment camp had been, from which many had been shipped to labour camps, she writes:

'I felt numb with shock. This place seemed so peaceful; it was impossible to imagine such traumatic events had taken place here. The stark realisation affected me deeply.'

She goes on to ask her tour guide how he can bear to keep coming to this spot and he replies,

'People need to remember... otherwise their deaths and the thousands of people who sacrificed their lives trying to protect them will have been for nothing.'

We have to remember. In these days of 'cancel culture' there is the danger that much could be lost - heroes of old no longer recognised, lives of notable characters rewritten and reinterpreted in the light of so called 'woke' values. Paul's words remind me of one of my favourite passages from Jeremiah, where the prophet writes:

'Stand at the crossroads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls.'

We cannot simply afford to discard the old ways - we need to learn from them, from the horrors, the faults, the mistakes - but we cannot simply cast them out altogether. It seems that the Sadducees get hold of the wrong end of the stick. They want to interpret the resurrection in terms of their own insight - or lack of it. Jesus tells them that

'those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage... they cannot die anymore, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection.'

As is often the case the gospel reading demonstrates how God's future plans, his bringing of transformation as the new age begins, comes about in the most unlikely of ways. We don't need to be scared or anxious - we can be comfortable with this mystery. In the meantime we need to remember and we need to look forward in trust, hope and faith.

Concluding with more words from Paul: 'Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.'

Post Communion

Gracious Lord, in this holy sacrament you give substance to our hope: bring us at the last to that fullness of life for which we long; through Jesus Christ our Saviour.
